WOMEN FOR FIRE SQUADS

Altho fire guard work is considered the most difficult and dangerous of volunteer civilian assignments, women will be recruited as regular members of the fire guard squads and will work on exactly the same basis as men, James M. Landis, director of civilian defense, has announced. Women outnumbered men in the British fire guard organization. The normal ratio is one man to two women in a British squad, but in many sectors three out of four fire guards are women. Fire Guards will receive special training enabling them to deal effectively with new bombing tactics and resulting fires in target area cities and towns. Women who are members of fire squads will be protecting their homes, their own families and their own neighbors from fires caused by incendiary bombs.

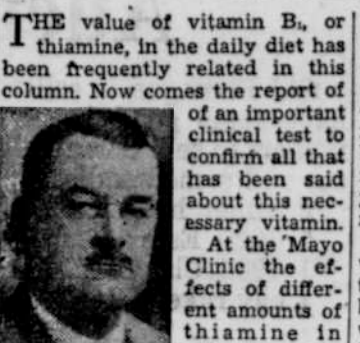

PRACTICAL HEALTH HINTS

Benefits of Thiamine in Your Diet

THE value of vitamin B, or thiamine, in the daily diet has been frequently related in this column. Now comes the report of an important clinical test to confirm all that has been said about this necessary vitamin.

At the Mayo Clinic the effects of different amounts of thiamine in adult human diets were studied for nearly 9 months by Drs. R. D. Williams, H. L. Mason, and R. M. Wilder. They got some interesting results.

Healthy women volunteers in this famous hospital were given substantial daily diets (2,250 calories) of common American foods, such as beef, vegetables, fruits and fruit juices, bread and butter, cake, and sugar. All groups received 6 ounces of flour, or products made from flour, which comprised about one third of their daily calories.

There was, however, a significant difference in these diets. One group got plain white flour, the second was favored with enriched white flour, and the third received

whole wheat flour. The enriched and whole wheat flours contained a little more than twice as much thiamine, or vitamin B, and about one third more riboflavin, or vitamin B₂, than the plain flour. The bread prepared from the enriched flour also contained milk solids just as our bakers customarily make it.

At the end of the 9 months the women who had been consuming the enriched and whole wheat breads were in fine fettle. They were also in much better condition than those who had been getting only half as much thiamine.

When this vitamin is too low in the diet, this deficiency generally causes weakness and loss of appetite, with irritability and other unpleasant and uncomfortable symptoms. Restore the full quota of thiamine, and these disturbances are promptly corrected.

All white bread in this country is now enriched with vitamins and food-minerals, in accordance with government regulations. As these physicians say in their report in the Journal of the American Medical Association, such standard enriched bread, made with milk, is nutritionally a satisfactory food. It contains thiamine, riboflavin, and niacin, as well as necessary iron and calcium and phosphorus.
