home, girls the soldiers know if they're single, changes in social relations past events, places he used to go and the community's night life.

And now there should be more room on library shelves to accommodate a greater number of books if they're of the war model type. For publishers are making books lighter and easier to handle. It's so they can manage with wartime restrictions on publishing materials that lighter-weight paper stock is being used, that margins are narrower, the space between lines of print is being reduced and the number of pages are being decreased. However, that doesn't mean that there will be fewer books published.

Don't be generous with your unused red or blue point ration stamps and turn them over to your merchant at the end of the ration period, the office of price administration has warned Mrs. America. For this gesture, innocent as it may seem, helps stimulate black markets for although the stamps are no longer good for consumer purchases they are valid for use by the retailer through trade channels for some time. The best thing for any housewife to do with unused red or blue point stamps at the end of the ration period is to destroy them.

And speaking of ration stamps, here's a reminder. Red "J" stamps are good throughout the month of June instead of expiring on May 31. The schedule of validity of other red stamps for the meats and fats program in June is as follows: "K", good from May 30 through June 30; "L", valid beginning June 20. All will expire on June 30.

Unless an army of volunteers can be recruited locally to staff canneries, Americans will have less canned goods next year. And this is an important step in the production of food vital to winning the war which can be taken by Mrs. America. In most communities the local United States employment service office can give you information about working in a cannery. It is expected that in nearly all communities housewives or employed women and others who cannot give up their full time will be willing to devote parts of days or nights or a certain amount of time each during the season to this essential war food production.

And speaking of canning food, here's latest information regarding the supply and cost of pressure cookers. Because of the urgent need for home food preservation equipment, the war production board has allotted materials to produce another 125,000 cookers bringing the total output to 275,000 which will exceed any previous year's production. The available cookers are being allocated through county farm rationing committees established by the department of agriculture. Specific dollars and cents ceilings have been set by the OPA on three war models of pressure cookers. Here's a chance to become an important part of the army's organization for air defense. Be a volunteer of the army air forces aircraft warning service for right now there is an urgent need for people living near the coastline of the United States to sign up for this duty. If you live on the west coast, apply or write to commanding general, 1V through your local defense council fighter command, Oakland, California. Every effort will be made to fit the applicant's available hours into some part of the service.
