



IRIS JAMISON AND WILLIS BERTRUM WED

In a double ring ceremony last Sunday, June 27 at 4 o'clock, Miss Iris Jamison, daughter of Mr and Mrs E. L. Jamison, and Willis Bertrum, son of Mr and Mrs Frank Bertrum of Colome, South Dakota, were united in marriage. In the presence of a few friends, Rev. M. H. Greenlee of the Methodist church performed the ceremony before a rose-covered bower on the lawn at the country home of the bride's parents.

Given in marriage by her father, the bride wore a floor-length white satin gown and a fingertip veil falling from a coronet of orange blossoms. Her only jewelry was a string of pearls, which had once belonged to her grandmother. She carried a bouquet of blue delphinium, pink roses and madonna lilies tied with white satin ribbon.

The couple had no attendants. Little Darlene Henderson, in a pastel pink organza ruffled floor-length dress was flower girl. She carried a bouquet of snapdragons, carnations and roses tied with white net ribbon from which she scattered petals.

The bride's mother wore a green flowered sheer rayon afternoon dress and a corsage of white roses.

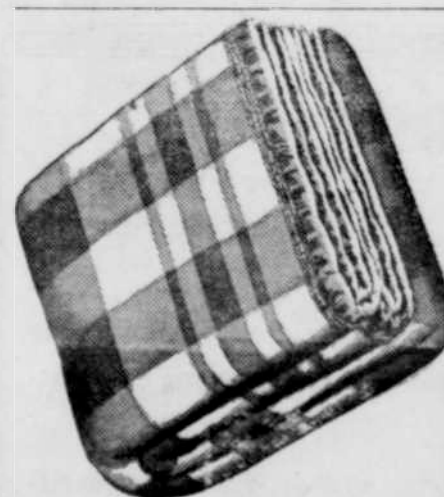
