## TOWERING STATE REVENUES

The most optimistic estimates of income tax revenues have been topped. In 1941 payments aggregated \$8 million, in 1942 they went up to \$13,810,000. When the 1943-1945 biennial budget was being drawn by the recent legislature the estimate of the majority was that income tax payments in 1943 would be around \$14 million. Payments this year have already exceeded \$19 million and are expected to reach \$20 million.

As a result of increased income tax payments, Earl Fisher, income tax commissioner, says it is certain that both state property tax and the elementary school tax levy for next year would be eliminated. There will also be available from the income tax funds about \$5 million to be distributed among school districts under the new school law enacted by the 1943 legislature.

### GOVERNOR SNELL HONORED

Governor Earl Snell returned to his executive duties Monday after a ten day trip to the national convention of governors in Columbus, O. He served on the important resolutions committee—the only westerner to be honored with a committee.

The theme of the convention was, win the war quickly as possible and sound post-war planning that will not be too little and too late. Resolutions were adopted favoring ample funds for forest patrol and conservation and to strengthen states rights.

### "YOU'VE HAD IT"

This English phrase, recently imported from London via "invasion" soldier mail, may become everyday language of the state liquor store clerks. There is no such thing as getting a favorite brand of liquor anymore. Liquor rationing, two quarters a month, is driving steady drinkers and spree drunks to "fortified" wines. It is obvious this will focus voter attention on the proposed repeal of the Burke law. This law would turn the profits from the sale of "fortified" wines into the old age pension fund.

### O.P.A. AUTHORITY

The state of Oregon is subject to orders from the office of price administration, but no means of enforcing a penalty exists under the law, according to an opinion given by Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle in answer to a request by the state welfare commission.

### WITHHOLDING TAX

State employees will have their federal withholding tax deducted according to tables prepared by the federal bureau of internal revenue, the state board of control has decided. There are about 7,000 state employees.

### CONVICTS WILL CUT WOOD

The state penitentiary has advised the state board of control that convicts would supply 7,000 cords of wood for state institutions next winter. The prison will charge the institutions \$5 a cord.

### STATE INSURANCE

The state of Oregon has power to insure its motor vehicles in a reciprocal exchange and there would be no violation of the state constitution if it buys stock in a corporation or loans the state's credit, according to a ruling by Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle as given to the state board of control.

### CAPITAL BRIEFS

After four years of receiving advice on how to run the state former governor Sprague is tell'em how to do it in his column "It Seems To Me" on the front page of his newspaper. . . Roy G. Buchanan, 60, former member of the state accident commission, died here last Friday after a heart attack. . . The navy department has ordered 258 enlisted men to Salem to attend Willamette University, term to begin July 5. . . Vern L. Drager, Portland, has been named acting supervisor of the enforcement division of the Oregon liquor control commission. . . There was only one fatality among the 1422 accidents reported to the state last week.

### Ration Calendar

**GASOLINE:** "A" book coupons No. 6, good for four gallons each, through July 21. "B" and "C" coupons cut to 2 1/2 gallons in shortage area.

**SUGAR:** Coupon No. 13 good for 5 lbs. through August 15. Coupons No 15 and 16 are good through October 31 for 5 lbs. each for home canning purposes. Housewives may apply to their local ration boards for more if necessary.

COFFEE: Stamp No. 24 (1 lb.) is good through June 30. Stamp 21 becomes valid for one pound July 22 to August 11.

FUEL OIL: Period 5 coupons valid in all zones until September 30.

SHOES: Stamp No. 18 (1 pair) is valid through October 31.

MEATS, ETC.: Red stamps J, K, L, M, N, expire June 30. Red stamp P becomes valid June 27; Q becomes valid July 4; R on July 11 S on July 18. All expire July 31.

PROCESSED FOODS: Blue stamps K, L, M, continue good through July 7. Blue stamps N, P, and Q will be valid from July 1 through August 7.
