Dr. Kerby Tells Landing Story

From then on it was a nightmare for two days. I guess you saw pictures in Life magazine of some of the cases that were sent back.

"Well we moved into Casa Blanca till the first of December and then next to Rabot. I liked Rabot and made friends there. That was where I went about hunting. The last of February we moved to Port Lyantay, about 30 miles from Rabot, and stayed there till the last of April. Since then we've been on the move. Oran, Algiers, Tunisia. We were in Tunisia when it all ended.

"Seeing and taking care of German and Italian prisoners certainly explodes the 'super-man' myth. Most of them were just kids and tickled to death to be captured. They came in trucks, motorcycles and on foot by thousands without any guard. We got lots of material, guns, tanks, food, ammunition, etc."

From another letter written June 3, while still in Africa, Captain Kerby said he is "getting fed up" on this picturesque bug and insect plagued land. He said he saw a grasshopper that measured five inches long.

One of the officers woke one morning to find a dollar sized spider sleeping on his pillow. He said the air is full of flying insects up to three inches long.

It hasn't been all work and no play for Capt. Kerby. He went on several bear hunts while in Rabot. On one hunt there were 50 native hunters, some afoot and some on horseback.

After the first drive they had a big feed given by the Caid. They had seven barbecued sheep, chickens, fruit and Kush Kush, which is a native rice dish and very good. The party only killed three bears and one jackal. (Dr. or Capt. Kerby didn't get any on that trip but he did on the next and also two jackals.)

The natives put on a "Fantasia" (after the barbecue) of horsemanship, native dances and music. Capt. Kerby said it was all very barbaric and the music weird. It was held up in the mountains. He said the country was quite pretty.

Capt. Kerby has been invited to several teas at wealthy Moroccan homes. People always removed their shoes before entering. They sit on the floor and ate with their fingers. (The natives only eat with their right hand).

At one home the first course was a large bowl of pigeon pie. Then they brought in a large roast turkey, not cut up. Next large bowl full of roast chicken, one per person. The Africans use a lot of spice and olive oil for seasoning. Then a big platter of almond pastries was served. The hosts served coffee and more pastry, then oranges and tangerines and mint tea and more pastry.

turned from a 13-months tour of duty as an aerial gunner engineer in a bomber over China. He wears the silver star, awarded for gallantry in action when he and his crew successfully completed the bombing of a Chinese town held by the Japs.

Sergeant Stubblefield has been forced to bail out of his plane once when it was shot down by enemy craft, and he has been grounded twice by anti-aircraft guns. The time he had to bail out, he landed only 15 minutes flying time from the Japanese line.

The sergeant, incidentally, has shot down six Jap aircraft himself. He also wears the defense ribbon, indication that he saw service one year prior to Pearl Harbor. He joined the army air corps in 1939.
