Mrs. America Meets The War

Mrs America has the answer to many a war mother's wish. . . to send a picture of the baby to daddy who's fighting for his country on foreign battlefields. The war department has announced that under certain conditions photographs of children under one year of age of soldiers serving overseas or of children born after the father left for overseas duty, may be sent by v-mail. The regulation form must not be altered in any way and the photograph is limited in size to not more than one-third of the correspondence space on the v-mail form. The photograph must appear on the upper left portion of the correspondence space. It may include the mother or some other person holding the child.

When Mrs America goes shopping this month, here are rationing dates for her to remember. Sugar stamp 13 in war ration book one remains valid for one pound through August 15. Stamps 15 and 16 are good for five pounds of sugar each to be used in home canning. Red stamps for 16 pounds of meats, fats, oils and cheeses, useable until July 31st, are P which became valid on June 27, Q which will be in effect on July 4, R on July 11 and S on July 18. In purchasing canned, frozen and certain dehydrated foods, blue stamps N, P, and Q valid July 1 and may be used through August 7.

These handy cartons used to carry soft drinks can no longer be made. Manufacture has been prohibited by war production board order to save paper-board for use by the armed forces and lend lease, and for packaging foods for civilians. Furthermore, restrictions have been placed on the manufacture of cartons and wrappers for cigarette packages, certain wearing apparel accessories, boxes and rubber heel boxes. However, Mrs America will be glad to know that the order does not effect paper shipping sacks or grocery variety bags. WPB expects that approximately 15,000 tons of paperboard and 2,000 tons of paper will be saved annually by these conservation measures.

Good news for the coffee drinkers in Mrs America's family. In view of the present favorable supply situation, the Office of Price Administration has increased the coffee ration to one pound every three weeks. Stamp 21 in war ration book one becomes valid for one pound of coffee on July 1 and will expire on July 21. Stamp 22 will be valid from July 22 to August 11. It is the first time since coffee rationing began, that supplies have reached a normal level and that imports to sustain that volume can be anticipated.

"Ladies-in-waiting" will be interested in the recent war production amendment which permits maternity dresses to be cut with a six inch fuller sweep. This increases the maximum width from 80 to 86 inches based on misses size 16 and junior miss size 15. Wrap around types may have a maximum sweep of 94 inches. In all other respects, however, maternity dresses are subject to the same regulations and restrictions relating to daytime and suit dresses.

Reversible raincoats for women, misses and children hereafter may only have two pockets on the outside and two on the inside. Other WPB changes allow belts and belt loops on overalls for women and girls and on little boys slacks and shorts—sizes 3 to 10—provided they do not have suspenders, a bib, or any button-on feature.

Treat that "welcome" mat on your front-door step with care. Production of fiber door mats has been cut off by a recent War Production order putting coir under restrictive controls. Coir, the fiber obtained from the shell of the coconut, from now on will be reserved for military orders.



RESPONSIBILITY LAW SKIDS

The so-called motor vehicle responsibility law won't jell as its con-selector Representative Frisbee, who won the "Oscar" at the recent legislature for introducing the most bills, intended it should.

After securing motor vehicle operators' permits from the state many motorists are having trouble getting their motor vehicle insurance for financial responsibility. Since the act became effective June 9 accident reports are coming to the secretary of state at the rate of more than 100 a day. The law requires that all drivers involved in a motor vehicle accident must file a report within 24 hours. If it occurs in an incorporated city the reports must be filed with the police department, otherwise with the sheriff. The reports are then sent to the secretary of state.

There are flaws in the law which will have to be eliminated at the next session of the legislature. Most of the difficulties arise from the lack of conformation of the new law with what the insurance companies consider a good or a poor risk. The state will in most cases issue a motor vehicle operators license to a person with an artificial limb but the insurance companies will almost invariably refuse to issue responsibility insurance. A man who passed all the state requirements for a motor vehicle operators license with a very high average and was issued a license cannot get responsibility insurance as the companies say he is too old.

Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell Jr. left this week for Boston and will go to Albany N. Y. and the capitals of other states which have motor vehicle responsibility laws, to study the working of this type of law.

REVENUES FROM UNCLAIMED ESTATES

Unclaimed estates net Oregon money, which reverts to the irremedy, which reverts to the irremedy school fund, comes from Western Oregon where adventurous persons from foreign lands have settled or invested and left no records or addresses of relatives.

Until 1935 the state made no effort to uncover these estates, taking only those which called to the attention of the state land board by banks and other agencies. The first year after a special investigator was employed in 1935 that revenues increased from \$20,000 to \$30,000.

The new rate of 8.5 mills per kilowatt hour, as compared with the old rate of 11.5 is retroactive to April 1, 1942 and will save the state \$17,500 a year. The company will refund the state \$21,000. The new contract is for the duration of the war and one year or not to exceed four years. These provisions reflect the attitude of the board of control who would consider contracting with Bonneville power authority now at a rate estimated to be around 4 mills per kilowatt hour. This however would require that the state invest in equipment and installation improvident in time of war.
