## TERROR OF ERROR

If federal and state income tax officials are right—and they usually are, a mental Frankenstein faces the income taxpayer. If anyone can reduce the many confusing codicils of the withholding tax law to a swift tale swiftly told he should be awarded the Nobel prize. The federal agents themselves are befuddled by many of the complicated provisions. The tangrams are too numerous to tabulate here. The primary and the simpler requirements are that after you have filled in your status slip which your employer has given you, the next chore will be to fill out a preliminary report and file it before Sept. 15, 1943. It will be a sticker to most people, yours may seem a simple job but wait till the officials see it, or you have shown it to some income tax expert and he points out that you are standing on your own foot for about \$100. Next a final report must be filed before March 15, 1944. These reports must be right if you expect to get proper credits for the probable overholdings of the withholding tax. Errors on either side of the books will be costly.

This year a married persons exemption is \$1248, your wife or you may file together or separately, each can claim \$624 exemption or either can claim \$1248. For each dependent \$312 is exempted. From here on the complications get interesting, and with a compound interest.

## STATE INCOME TAXES LOWER

The fiscal year upon which income tax returns are figured and the percentage rate fixed ended June 30. Figures have not yet been officially given but it is definitely certain that the provisional reduction will be around 75 per cent. This means that for the same earnings your state income taxes will be one-fourth what they were last year.

## WAR CHEST INCORPORATES

Articles of incorporation for Oregon War Chest have been filed with the state corporation department by Charles A. Sprague, J. J. Gard, Elliott R. Corbett, O. A. Hougham and F. J. Lonergan. The object, to make allocations for funds raised for various activities of the war in the state and to promote interest in them.

## COAST FIRE PROTECTION

State forester N. S. Rogers has just returned from San Francisco where he attended a council of army, navy and civilian representatives called to contribute information that will aid in cooperative plans for fire protection. The conclusions of the meeting will aid General DeWitt in forming general orders to be issued from headquarters of the fourth army immediately.

## ARMY BOOK SERVICE

The Oregon branch of the Ninth service command library, which operated in the state library for the past 15 months distributed 43,533 books to the army.

The branch at the Capital has just been closed, its work to be handled by the Seattle branch. Most of the books were donated by the public.

## GUBERNATORIAL APPOINTMENTS

Just before leaving for a Northwest governors conference in Idaho, Governor Earl Snell appointed Paul L. Crooks, Portland contractor, to fill the unexpired term of Lloyd J. Wentworth on the state liquor control commission. Wentworth resigned recently. It is expected Crooks will succeed to the chairmanship of the commission.

Ben S. Morrow of Portland has been appointed a member of the state board of examining engineers to succeed Percy Cupper of Salem who died recently. S. H. Graf, Corvallis and Leverett Davis, Cornucopia were appointed to the board all to serve six year terms.

Dr. A. R. Hedges of Medford was reappointed a member of the state board of naturopathic examiners for a three year term.

### "SUMMER JAM"

Have you ever tried to make jam by combining cherries and raspberries? The result is delicious and your family and friends will proclaim you the best jammaker in the valley.

After you have cooked the fruit in an open pan on your range until it comes to a boil and all ingredients are thoroughly mixed, put it in your oven and bake it, stirring occasionally.

Your sugar problem is as acute this year as it was last and I would suggest that if you want to make more jam and jelly than your ration allows, use half white corn syrup and half sugar, thereby making twice as much jam, it won't be quite as sweet, but most jam is too sweet anyway.

### RASPBERRY AND CHERRY JAM

1 cup pitted cherries  
1 cup crushed raspberries  
1 cup sugar  
1 cup white corn syrup  
Cook the cherries in a very small amount of water until the skins are tender. Add the raspberries, sugar, and syrup and boil the mixture until thick. Pour into sterilized jars and seal.

group 43.5 per cent were successfully vaccinated against smallpox and 44.7 percent against diphtheria. Thirty school children were registered, 80 per cent were vaccinated against smallpox and 73.3 per cent against diphtheria. Of the seven infants registered none have been against either smallpox or diphtheria. Twentyeight of the 255 registered had taken whooping cough serum and 2.3 per cent of the 255 had taken the tuberculin test within last year. One hundred sixty five parents representing that many families attended the conferences. One hundred eighteen children referred to their own family physician and 64 to dentists. Many children were either under the care of a physician or were going regularly to a physician. Many had recently had dental work done. Of the 218 in the pre-school age group 64 are starting to school this fall for the first time. Follow-up visits will be made on the children that were referred to the physician and dentist.

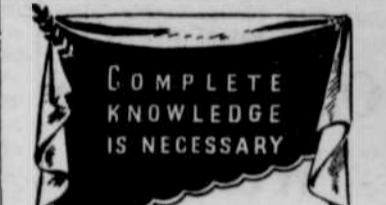
