Mr. and Mrs. Dan Holly recently received word that their son, Raymond Holly, master sargent in the air force ordnance department in North Africa had been decorated with four ribbons one for having been in the armed forces prior to Pearl Harbor; one for having been among the first American forces to land in North Africa; one for participation in the Tunisian campaign and the fourth for good conduct.

"Shangri-La" Is To Be Built As Fighting Symbol

During the remainder of July, residents of Nyssa will be called upon to buy at least \$1 worth of war stamps for the purchase and construction of the "Shangri-La" airplane carrier for the United States navy as a symbol of the havoc that is to be wrought upon Japan.

The "mystery ship" has been authorized as a real fighting American aircraft carrier--a ship to uphold every intrepid tradition of the Jimmy Doolittle raiders who first bombed Tokyo from a base described as the mythical "Shangri-La". A nation-wide drive has been started to raise \$135,000,000 for the mystery ship through the purchase of war stamps. Stamps may be purchased in Nyssa at the First National bank and the post office and from local merchants. The bank and post office officials have agreed to designate all money spent for stamps there during the remainder of the month for the Shangri-La.

Every man, woman and child is expected to buy at least \$1 worth of war stamps between now and July 31 in addition to regular bond and stamp purchases. No one will call on you, so you are asked to voluntarily make the purchase.

The Boys back from Bataan have a message for you from a member of the army nursing staff:

"Those American boys--who fought for you with their backs to the wall, waiting for help that never reached them--came from the land of plenty, but when their lives were at stake all they had was plenty of nothing.

"They were outnumbered, outgunned and out-supplied. They were so short of ammunition that anti-aircraft gunners often had to hold their fire until enemy planes were on top of them. They were so short of bandages and guaze nurses had to wash out old ones and use them again.

"But they were never short of courage. They

never spoke of surrender. They just went on fighting, and hoping and dying. And no sacrifice was ever too great.

"They gave everything they had. Now it's up to us to buy war bonds, not only if we can, but all we can. Please believe me, folks--that's the way the boys on Bataan would like to be remembered.

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
