**NORTHWEST FUTURE**  
East is East and West is West has become a wartime slogan with variations and exceptions. It is now seen as a postwar axiom of commercial significance within the borders of the United States.

The wartime boosting of freight rates may become the bottleneck of the postwar development of the Pacific Coast.

Postwar Planning Commissioner John Kelly reports that approximately \$100,000,000 of emergency public works projects in Oregon were earmarked for the transition period following the war.

Ivan Block of the Bonneville administration, who has been cooperating with the postwar planning commission, has assembled statistics on the possibilities of a light metals industry, dealing with the relative costs, markets and freight rates as compared with similar factors at eastern points, which have dominated this field.

Postwar planning in Oregon can clear the track for state development. The green light must burn bright-burn away the antiquated red tape eastern manufacturers have too long manipulated to enmesh western industry.

An inspection and planning journey over more than 1000 miles of the main highway of Oregon was concluded last week by the state highway commissioners. The trip was routed down the coast highway and back over the Pacific highway. It was the second of a three lap program with two principal motives, of acquaint the three new commissioners with the projects under way and to secure first-hand information that the commission may conform its work with the postwar program which is expected to complete a modern system in three years at a cost of \$200,000,000.

The first lap covered the Jordan Valley section. The last lap will start July 24 over the John Day section.

**41,000 ACRES FOR REHABILITATION**  
The state board of forestry will purchase approximately 26,000 acres of logged over timberlands in Marion county for rehabilitation.

The lands in question include 24,000 acres lying due east of Silver Falls state park and 2,000 acres lying along the Santiam river just above Mill City. Both tracts are perfect set-ups for postwar planning. The forestry board already has received 15,000 acres from Marion county in tax delinquent lands which will be part of the rehabilitation program and parts used to augment state parks.

**SHIPBUILDERS PAY MORE**  
The new occupational disease law will cause shipbuilders to make larger contributions to the state industrial accident commission fund than the rates charged other employers will not be materially changed.

Oregon has one of the lowest rates among the 23 states having occupational disease coverage. This is possible because the state's mining and chemical industries, which have a large percentage of occupational diseases, are not extensive.

## INFERIOR CANDY FLOODS MARKET

"Black market" candy of definitely inferior quality is flooding counties under the Portland OPA jurisdiction selling at exorbitant prices. Richard G. Montgomery, director, announced today following a check-up of retail stores by OPA investigators.

Chocolates which ordinarily should sell at around 75c or 85c a pound are being shipped in from outside the state and sold at prices ranging as high as \$1.39 to \$1.50 a pound, Montgomery declared.

Approximately 100 retail stores in the Portland OPA District, COVERING Oregon and a few counties in Washington, taking advantage of the insatiable sweet tooth in this war-boom area, are buying the candy often after it has passed through the hands of one or more jobbers, each taking a mark-up, so that the consumer eventually pays about twice what the candy is actually worth, he said.

## TABLES ON POINT VALUES PLANNED

Official tables of consumer point values for canned fruits and vegetables and rationed meats, fats and dairy products, will be mailed late this month directly to retailers, wholesalers and processors, beginning with the tables for August, the district OPA announced today.

Use of the mails is viewed by OPA officials as a major simplification which will save the trade the time-consuming inconvenience of obtaining each new table at the local postoffice.

For the present the table carrying the trade (wholesale) point value of meats, fats, oils and dairy products will not be mailed, but may be obtained at the local boards, as formerly.

Under the new arrangement, the processed food and meats-fats sheets will be printed on separate sheets, instead of together, with the back of each table carrying pertinent information regarding rationing.

## ONTARIO TO GET FIRE EQUIPMENT

Ontario, July 29 (Special)-- Ontario is to have a new front mount pumper for its fire protection. The new unit will deliver 500 gallons per minute and is to be supplied from the additional fire equipment assigned to the state by the federal government in defense areas.

Also the city is to receive the necessary equipment to go with the pumper, including fire fighting clothing for five firemen.

This was the information given to Fire Chief Arthur Atherton when he arrived in Salem for the annual convention of fire chiefs. Mr. Atherton was accompanied to the state capital by Mrs Atherton and her sister, Mrs Paul Harris. They also visited relatives in other western cities after the sessions in Salem.

## SORTING OF JAPS WILL BE STARTED

A formula for segregation of loyal Japanese from the disloyal ones in the United States will be started by September, according to announcement reaching here from Denver.

Three classes into which the Japanese now held in relocation centers will be segregated pending final disposal were announced by Dillon B. Myer, head of the war

relocation authority. The classes are as follows:  
1. Those Japanese who would like to be repatriated.  
2. Those who are Americans and want to continue to be Americans.  
3. Those Japanese who refused to swear allegiance to the United States, but yet did not want to be returned to Japan.

Myer said that the state department will repatriate those who want to be returned to their homeland as soon as it sees fit. However, until the repatriates is effected, the repatriates will be held at the new permanent relocation center at Tule Lake, in northern California.

## DEALERS ABLE TO SELL OLD TIRES

Dealers having in stock used passenger tires that are not fit for recapping, but which can be made serviceable for emergency use by temporary repairs, may brand them with an "O" on the sidewall and sell them, with or without repairs, to consumers holding grade 111 ration certificates, the district OPA announced today.

Thus branded, these casings will be the same as the "emergency tires" dealers recently were authorized to buy from the Defense Supplies Corporation through the Rubber Manufacturers Association of America, Inc.

A dealer branding tires in stock

must report to his OPA District office not later than the tenth day of each month the number branded during the preceding month.

Mr. Hopkins, formerly of Nyssa and principal of the Oregon Trail school from 1930 to 1939, went to Imbler to serve as athletic director and after coaching for two years was elected superintendent of schools. While in Nyssa Mr. Hopkins said he was sorry that he did not have time to see many of his friends here.
