filling applications, it is very possible that those who delay may have difficulty in getting supplies before the first cold weather arrives next fall.

Distribution of the simple renewal application form to householders who received a ration of fuel oil last year was completed several days ago. Many of these have been returned, and the board has already processed applications and mailed new rations to a large number of the applicants. These

householders are thus able to make immediate arrangements with their dealers to fill their fuel tanks before cold weather sets in. The importance of making these arrangements early was stressed by the board.

DERRICK MOVING PROPOSALS MADE

Moving a hay derrick under or near a power line is not hazardous. If the proper safety rules are observed, Bernard Frost, local Idaho Power company manager, stated.

"Before moving a derrick always look for wires that might be contacted by the derrick," Mr. Frost said.

The company makes the following recommendations:

Be sure that there is sufficient clearance.

Level the boom and tie it at both ends so that it cannot swing.

Do not hold onto or be in contact with chains or cables.

Never attempt to raise or move electric wires.

Tractors are more preferable than horses for moving derricks.

If horses are used, do not ride the derrick.

Call the Idaho Power company for assistance. No charge will be made.

MORE SUGAR IS NOW AVAILABLE

Housewives will be glad to learn that the OPA has allowed increased amounts of sugar this year for jams, jellies, it was explained. This is a more generous allowance than last year when sugar for preserves was limited to one pound per person.

Stamps 15 and 16 in war ration book 1 are good for 5 pounds of sugar each so this reduces the amount of sugar which can be issued by local rationing boards to 15 pounds. It was emphasized by the OPA that the 25 pounds is a maximum allowance and that total sugar requirements of most consum-

ers, based on one pound per four quarts of fruit, will be considerably less.

Where a consumer has already received a home canning sugar allowance from the board since March 1, 1943, she may not use stamp 15 and 16 to obtain sugar if in doing, she will have received more than 25 pounds, the OPA declared.

Housewives are urged by the OPA to put up more fruits at home so there will be less demand on the limited civilian supply of commercially packed foods. Millions of soldiers and war workers depend entirely on commercially packed foods.

PRICES ARE SET ON CITRUS FRUIT

Maximum prices for imported citrus fruit were set today as those already established by the Office of Price Administration for domestic citrus fruit of the most similar varieties and packings.

This pricing action was taken today by OPA through Amendment No. 4 to Maximum Price Regulation No. 292 (Sales of Citrus Fruits

by Packers, Brokers, Auction Markets, Terminal Sellers and Intermediate Sellers) to meet a situation which shortly will see considerable amounts of citrus fruits, principally grapefruit and oranges, imported from the Caribbean area.

The amendment will become effective July 29, 1943.

In This Immediate Section

A scarcity of hay throughout the country may have a most disastrous effect on the dairy industry of this section unless immediate steps are taken by hay raisers as well as dairy herd owners NOW. Outside buyers are coming into this territory to contract for the present hay crop. Should hay raisers continue to sell their crop and should dairy herd owners fail to make preparation for hay for winter feeding, undoubtedly there will be a serious shortage of feed which will mean a curtailment of milk production.
