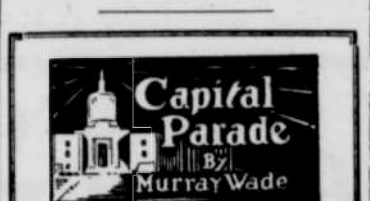

CAN'T RATION THIRST

Just when federal authorities were all set to ban the interstate transportation of beer, that more freight cars would be available for war work, 'ol man HI Wages swaggared over and beat them to the punch.

The ban would have amounted to an order to beer drinkers of Oregon and each of the other states to drink their locally brewed products. Now there are thousands of freight cars doing war work that formerly were hauling Cincinnati beer to Milwaukee and vice versa and between the 30,000 brewery cities of America.

Tyros economists are accrediting, what they consider to be prohibition without prohibs, to the much written law of supply and demand. The tyros are off their premises in that there is nothing like prohibition and the beer shortage is not caused by supply and demand but by the first stage of inflation. There is more beer being made than ever before in this country, about two million barrels more a year. More beer drinkers have more money, so much more that there is a shortage of beer in some localities much of the time, plenty all the time in others.

A canny old printer here at the Capital has added a new item to his stock of ready printed signs. It is outculling "For Sale", "For Rent" and "No Trespassing" signs. It reads, "No Beer Today".

OVERLOADERS STYMIED

Violators of state log hauling regulations are becoming too flagrant, the state highway commission has decided. The trucks of twelve guilty operators have been ordered off the road for a period of ten days and have had their license permits canceled.

The commission has announced a strict enforcement policy and asked for deputyships from state police for weightmasters of the commission that the may act more directly with prosecutions. Overloaders will not be allowed to complete delivery of illegal loads but will be forced to dump the excess portion by the roadside and placed under arrest.

PRAY REAPPOINTED

Captain Charles P. Pray has been reappointed state police superintendent for a term of four years by Governor Earl Snell. Pray, a former FBI agent has held this position since the department's creation in the administration of Governor Meier. He was also reappointed by governors Martin and Sprague.

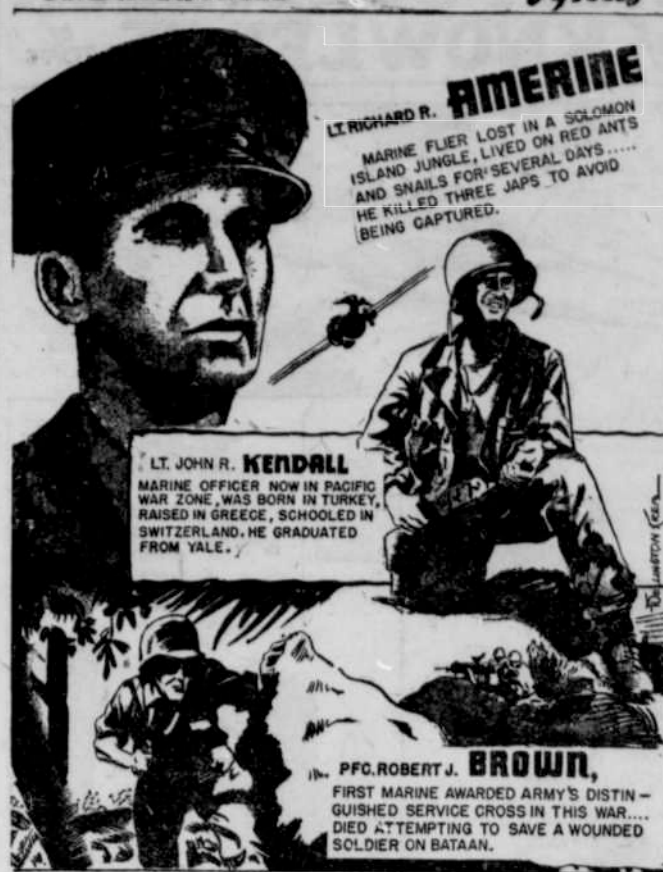
ATTORNEYS PLEA

WAR CHEST WORK STARTS
At a meeting of the 50 directors of Oregon War Chest former governor Sprague previously appointed chairman was elected president, Marguerite Slasek, secretary; J. J. Gard, treasurer; and Irl McSherry, executive director.

Quotas were established for the amount of funds each county will raise for 16 war relief agencies. The directors recommended that the fund raising campaign begin October 18 and end November 30.

Farm WAR NEWS

"NEW FOOD RECORD SET"

American farmers are doing the job that gloom spreaders and shortage shouters predicted couldn't be done--produced more food this year than the record-setting 1942 output. The Department of Agriculture's latest food situation report places total food production for 1943 at 4 per cent more than last year and 31 per cent higher than the average of the five pre-war years of 1935-39. Increased livestock and me-time at production accounted for a good share of this total gain. Farmers planted 5 per cent more land to food crops this year, but yields are under last years.

"FRUIT FOR ALCOHOL RESTRICTED"

Manufacture of alcoholic products from 25 varieties of fruit has been restricted by the war food administration in a move to meet civilian and military requirements for fruits and berries.

These fruits may be sold for conversion to alcoholic products only when the County USDA war board exempts a specified quantity because it is unfit for human consumption or because there is no market available.

"DIXIE SENDS THANKS"

State AAA farmer committeemen from North Carolina, Georgia, Mississippi and Texas this week brought the thanks and appreciation of southern states farmers for the 150 million pounds of soil-saving cover crop seeds Oregon farmers sent the southland last year. Here to get first hand information on production and processing of the seed, the committeemen reported that cover crops grown from Oregon winter legume and annual ryegrass seeds are playing a major role in boosting production of war-needed food and fiber crops on southern farms.

"MORE WHEAT IN 1944"

Extensive use of wheat for feed is the principal reason for a 1944 goal of 68 million acres, 26 per cent larger than this year. Increased wheat plantings will be sought in Oregon, but there still is need for maintaining production of other essential war crops. The war food administration is asking Oregon wheat farmers to follow this formula: Before planting winter wheat, first hold out all the land possible for dry peas, dry beans, potatoes

reaching war channels. Packers and retailers have left the fat on meat cuts, and only part if it has been coming back from kitchens. So now the WFA plans to spread out feed supplies by raising leaner hogs, and to get fats for muntions from vegetable oil crops.

"HOG CEILING, LICENSING DUE"

The \$14.75 ceiling on hogs at Chicago which becomes effective this month will put the corn-hog ratio at the average of the last 20 years. Ceilings on markets other than Chicago, such as Portland, will be set according to normal trade differentials, the WFA reports. With the ceiling price, a new hog licensing system for packers will be put into effect August 15. The new system will put the government in a better position to back its \$13.75 price support promise, as a packer who pays above or below the ceiling can be denied a license. Farm slaughters will not be affected by the licensing plan. Farmers who slaughter meat will continue to operate under the slaughter permit program established this spring.
