Farm WAR NEWS

FEED WHEAT MOVEMENT LAGS

The feed wheat program is now on a continuing basis, and previous interruptions resulting from congressional allocations being exhausted now will be avoided. However, Commodity Credit reports that they are up against a transportation problem. Railroads are unable to supply cars to take care of orders on hand. Because of this, feed wheat buyers cannot expect immediate delivery if the wheat has to be shipped in from points outside the county.

CROP INSURANCE VOID
The Federal Crop Insurance corporation is notifying 4,500 Oregon wheat growers that their three-year crop insurance contracts have been cancelled for 1944 and 1945 by provisions of the agricultural appropriations act approved by congress last month. Insurance on the 1943 crop—the first year of the contract—remains in effect.

MORE BURLAP BAGS.
More burlap bags for packaging 1943 grain and seed crops are allowed Oregon farmers by a war production board order issued last week. Previously limited to 70 per cent of the bags used in 1941, farmers now may obtain 100 per cent of their 1941 base. If this year's crop is larger than in 1941, the bag allocation may be increased proportionately.

MARKET HOGS EARLY
The national war meat board's appeal to "market hogs early" is sound advice for Malheur county farmers, believes Glen Hutchinson, chairman of the county SDA war board. There are several reasons why farmers will find it both patriotic and to their own advantage to market early. This county, like the rest of the nation, has a large 1943 pig crop, sharply increased over last year. If all of the hogs go to market at one time, packers won't be able to handle them. Plant capacity is limited by shortage of help and facilities. Hogs sent to market early will spread marketings over a longer period and relieve the pressure during the peak season later. Also, hogs fed to weights heavier than 200-250 pounds turn more of the feed into fat, less into meat.

WHEAT PAYMENTS REVISED
The war food administration has announced revised rates of payments to farmers under the 1943 agricultural conservation program, in order to adjust available funds to increased participation in the program. The revised wheat conservation payment rate is 8.5 cents a bushel, compared to the former rate of 9.2 cents a bushel.

NEW STATE JOB

Observers note Governor Earl Snell has developed a quiet and unobtrusive way of getting tough jobs done. A good example of his well regulated energy is the case of the industrial accident commission. It had become very much a one-man machine; a grand visor, a rubber stamp and the third member just so-much minority. Under this set-up rulings were made and laws lobbied through the legislature that lost sight of the fact that the commission was created to function for the benefit of all classes alike. The occasional employer was discriminated against. Before the first day of last July it cost a small homeowner \$10 minimum for state accident insurance that he might be relieved of the possibility of losing his home if he hired a man to put one shingle on his house. This law was lobbied by the "rubber stamp" at the order of the "grand visor." Farmers didn't like it. Small homeowners didn't like it. After the 1943 legislature neglected to arrange for an administrator (required by the federal government to care for the unemployment compensation department for which the government furnishes the money) the governor gathered data from other states and began to design a new pattern for the commission.

At his request the commission has just created the new position of secretary-administrator, naming Ralph W. Emmons to fill it. He was head of correspondence, and administrative assistant to the governor. He will reorganize the work of the commission.

MANY SCHOOLS TO CLOSE
The shortage of school teachers will hit rural districts hardest as metropolitan districts are offering salaries as high as \$250 a month. Rex Putnam, state superintendent, predicts there will be from 200 to 250 grade and high schools that will not be open for the 1943-1944 school year.

Enrollment at the Monmouth school for teachers has dropped from a 1200 high in previous years to 300 this year.

STATE OFFICES MOVE
The state banking department, located for several years in the down town district of the capital, has been moved into offices on the first floor of the capitol. The land board recently moved from the capitol to the state library building.

to make room for the banking department.

ROSSMAN HONORED

Supreme Court Justice George Rossman has been appointed chairman of the American Bar Association's section of judicial administration. He will attend the association's convention in Chicago August 23-24.

This is the first time that the position has gone to a judge living west of the Mississippi.

ALL CITIES BENEFIT

All Oregon cities, even those which prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverages, are entitled to receive the state distribution of revenues received from the sale of liquor permits. Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle has ruled in reply to a request from the attorney for the liquor control commission.

REVENUE UP

Roy Mills, board of control secretary, reports that relatives of patients in the state hospital are paying \$20,000 a month compared with \$13,000 a year ago. He states that the main reason for the increase is that relatives of patients have more money.

STATE SHORTS

Board of control says flax acreage in Oregon is down about 20 per cent. There were 1413 accidents in Oregon industry last week. About 150 real estate brokers and salesmen will take state examinations next week. 7.6 per cent more insurance is held by Oregonians now than there was this time last year. Persons seeking employment with Oregon Aircraft Associates, a firm which will operate near Salem on the Portland road will be cleared through the U. S. employment office. The board of control has spent a week in search for a successor to Miss Edna Russell who resigned as superintendent of the state industrial school for girls.
