TWO IN ONE--OATMEAL GRIDDLE CAKES

Will your family eat cooked cereal during the summer? If not, serve Oatmeal Griddle Cakes occasionally and give them a stick-to-the-ribs breakfast with plenty of "oom-

OATMEAL GRIDDLE CAKES

1/2 cup all-purpose enriched flour
4 t. baking powder
1 t. salt
1 1/2 cup quick-cooking rolled oats
1 egg, well beaten
1 t. melted shortening
1 t. molasses
3-4 cup water
3-4 cup milk

Sift flour, measure and sift with baking powder and salt. Add rolled oats. Combine egg, shortening, molasses, water and milk. Add dry ingredients. Beat until smooth. Have griddle very hot and bake cakes. Reduce heat for later bakings.

RATION BOOK NO. 2

October 2.--Expiration date of red stamps X, Y and Z, last of the red stamps series in War Ration Book 2. X becomes valid August 22; Y on August 29, and Z on September 5.

September 20.--Expiration date of blue stamps R, S and T (processed foods). Blue stamps U, V and W become valid September 1, good through October 20.

RATION BOOK NO. 3

(Brown stamps) Replacement book containing coupons to be used as those in ration book 2 run out.

October 2. Expiration date of brown stamps A and B. October 30--Expiration date of brown stamps C, D, E and F. A becomes valid September 12; B on September 19; C on September 26; D on October 3; E on October 10; and F on October 17. Each weekly series good for 16 points.

RATION BOOK NO. 1

Sugar. October 31--Expiration date stamp No. 14, five pounds. Can-

ling sugar stamps No. 15 and 16, each good for 5 pounds, through October 31.

Shoes. October 31--Expiration date of stamp No. 18 for one pair of shoes.

FUEL OIL

September 30--Period 1 coupons in new fuel oil rations valid through January 3, 1944. One unit, period 5 coupons valid through September 30 for 10 gallons. Ten unit, period 5 coupons, valid through September 30 for 100 gallons. Coupons with gallonage printed on the face valid for amount indicated until expiration date shown on coupon sheet.

GASOLINE

September 21--Expiration date of No. 7 stamps in A book, each good for 4 gallons.

TIRES

Cars with C ration books must have tires inspected every 3 months; B books every 4 months; A books every 6 months. September 30 next inspection deadline for A book holders. Commercial motor vehicles--tire inspections every 6 months or every 5,000 miles, whichever occurs first.

OREGON FARMER INCOME CLIMBS

Cash farm income in Oregon for 1942 reached approximately \$220,000,000, the greatest of record, according to estimates of the U. S. department of agriculture and the Oregon agriculture extension service. This amount is nearly double the average from 1935 to 1939, before World War II. For the first four months of 1943, furthermore, the cash farm income in Oregon from the sale of crop and animal products was nearly one-fifth greater than for the same period in 1942.

Agriculture is the principal basic source of income in Oregon over a period of years, but timber and lumber is a close second when the value added by manufacture is included in figuring income, according to U.S.D.A. and O.S.C. statistics. Mine and quarry products and fishery output are additional important basic resources. These four, with value added by manufacture included, usually account for near one-half of Oregon's income, except during periods of economic depression.

STORAGE URGED ON POTATO MEN

Oregon potato growers in principal producing areas are advised by the Oregon USDA war board to arrange now for storage space to take care of their crops between harvesting and marketing.

Additional space will be needed for this year's large crop in Oregon, expected to be about 30 per cent greater than the 1942 production. Growers who are unable to obtain sufficient space in existing facilities are advised to arrange immediately for building of additional storage. Assistance in obtaining materials and WPB approval for new construction is available through county USDA war boards.

Klamath county growers are providing additional space for 400,000 bushels of this year's potato crop. Most of this new storage is being constructed on the farms where the potatoes are grown.

JOINING NURSE CORPS IS URGED

"If you join the cadet nurse corps you will be given all expenses, including books, fees, maintenance and hospital and street uniforms" according to information received by Mrs Edna Farris, county health nurse, from Mrs Ethel Norene, R. N. of Portland, chairman of recruit-

Glen Hutchinson, chairman of the county USDA war board, announced here this week.

Under the new licensing system Hutchinson explained, all slaughterers except farmers ill be licensed to slaughter livestock under certain conditions. These will include compliance with quotas and with all livestock and meat orders, and payment for hogs of not more than OPA ceiling prices and not less than FWA support prices.

Farmers will continue to operate under the slaughter permits issued them by the county war board. The new regulations provide that any farmers who did not slaughter in 1941 may obtain a permit from the county war board for delivery of not more than 400 pounds of meat in one calendar year. Quotas in excess of 400 pounds must be based on 1941 slaughter, and permits in these cases will be issued by the FWA area meat supervisor. This provision is a change from the original regulations, which gave farmers with no 1941 slaughter base their choice of three animals or 300 pounds of meat.

No permit or license is required to slaughter livestock for home consumption, provided the slaughterer raised the animal or is a farmer and owns the animal.

Possibility of wider market outlets for county livestock is seen by Glen Hutchinson in a new provision permitting extension of limited federal inspection to any slaughtering plant. Slaughterers now may apply for inspection limited to products or animals they wish to sell to the government. This would have the effect of increasing the number of livestock that local plants

can slaughter, since quota restrictions apply only to slaughter for civilian consumption.

At the request of the state meat marketing supervisor, the county war meat committee is completing the review of all permits issued under the original program, and will continue to transmit weekly reports from local slaughterers, the war board chairman said. These permits and other evidence collected by the committee will provide the basis for issuance of licenses by FDA to butchers and local slaughterers, he has been informed.

Until new licenses are issued slaughterers, butchers and custom slaughterers will continue to operate under their present permits and quotas, the chairman reported.
