BUSINESS SHOWS INCREASE

The small-town merchant who has been able to "hang on" during the period of rationing and merchandise shortages has proved that he will be able to continue operation of his business for the remainder of the war, providing, of course, that the war does not extend over an unreasonable period of time.

The small-town business man has proved he can "take it", by increasing his business during the last several months by using his ingenuity effectively. More than 94 per cent of 2722 wholesale grocery and drug dealers reporting in a recent survey said their business with small-town merchants has increased an average of 20 per cent during the last 12 months, according to the Western Newspaper Union, which has just completed a thorough national survey.

The various estimates of increase range from 10 per cent to as high as 100 per cent, making an average of 20 per cent. The survey was conducted in towns having 10,000 population or less.

"These thou sands of communities, together with the farm population, comprise what is properly called rural America and contain more than half the people of the United States", Vice President Earl E. Sproul of the Western Newspaper Union said.

Strangely, the increase has resulted from scarcity; that is scarcity of certain articles. In an effort to remain in business, the merchants have added items an even entire new lines of merchandise.

Trade increases have been noticeable in rural communities ever since gasoline rationing became effective and more or less forced people to buy at or near home. However, that is not the only reason. One of the most important causes of the increased business is the greatly increased income of the average person in the rural areas, especially the farmers.

American ambition, aggressiveness and initiative have enabled the merchants and farmers to weather the terrific gales of war and now, having solved many of their problems, should be able to sail through safely to the end of the war.

Date Nut Bread sandwiches are satisfying and tasty and children and grownups will eat every crumb. If you want to try this recipe and have no dates on hand, use raisins or dried prunes.

DATE NUT BREAD
1 c. white flour
2 t. bak. powder
½ t. salt
1 c. whole wheat flour
4 T. shortening
½ c. brown sugar
½ c. nuts
½ c. dates
1 egg, well beaten
1 c. milk

Sift white flour, baking powder and salt. Add whole wheat flour. Cut in shortening until mixture is very fine. Add brown sugar, nuts and dates. Combine egg and milk. Turn into dry ingredients, stirring just enough to combine. Place in greased pan and bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, about 1 hour.

BONDED DEBT PAYMENTS

The bonded indebtedness of the state of Oregon will be reduced \$2,266,083.15 on October 1 when the state treasurer will pay New York agents \$1,020,250, in principal and \$188,335.78 in interest on highway bonds, \$700,000 in principal and \$316,356.25 in interest on veterans' state aid bonds and \$40,500 in principal and \$614.12 in interest on Oregon district interest bonds.

The net debt of the state on October 1, 1943, after deductions of assets and investments applying against indebtedness will be about \$7,000,000, State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott reports.

INCORPORATED BUSINESS PAY

Corporations operating in Oregon will enrich the state five and one-half million dollars within the next three weeks. Their taxes for the first quarter of the fiscal year become due October 1, as usual. The date for individuals to pay the first quarter was extended to October 15 by the 1943 legislature. Many people have overlooked the extension as hundreds of letters are pouring into the tax commission asking for tax statements-with an "answer by return mail" request in many.

FEDERAL GOV. OBJECTS

Oregon's community property laws, which permit a husband and wife to divide income of either for tax income calculation, will be held up for a year or more. The fate of the Oregon law, which was copied after the Oklahoma law, depends on court decisions in a suit filed by the federal treasury department. There is one strike against the instigators of the suit, who have just lost their case in the board of appeals but have appealed to the circuit board of appeals. The case then, in all probability, will go to the United States Supreme Court. In the meantime federal income tax collectors refuse to recognize the Oregon law pertaining to community property calculations and similar laws in ten other states.

TRUCKS WANTED

The United States Army wants 50 trucks in Oregon that will assist in moving food supplies to 75,000 trainees in Central Oregon, pay from \$6 to \$9.20 per hour. Farmers and owners of privately operated machines are asked to rally for this emergency. Public Utilities Commissioner Geo. H. Flagg will issue special permits and assist volunteers.

FORESTRY LAWS CLARIFIED

Three recent rulings by Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle pertain to forest lands: The state board of forestry cannot change more than 5 cents an acre per year for protection of privately owned lands and in no case can the charge be

more than the actual cost of service. Losses from tax delinquencies cannot be figured in the cost. The state can provide such protection at a budget estimate. Lands acquired by the veterans state aid commission through foreclosure are not subject to fire patrol taxes.

APPOINTMENTS

Mary Way has been appointed superintendent of Hillcrest, state industrial school for girls. She succeeds Edna Russell who resigned to take a position with the Pacific Protective Society of Portland.

Eva A. Davis, of Hood River, has been appointed by Governor Earl Snell to a membership on the state board of examination and registration of graduate nurses, the term to end April 1, 1944. She succeeds Lucille Perozzi, who resigned when she moved from the state.

CAPITAL SHORTS

Governor Arthur B. Langley of Washington was the guest of Governor Earl Snell during the tenth annual convention of Oregon republican clubs here this week. Old-age benefits decreased 6 per cent. Ten lads from V-12 navy school at Willamette University were added to the roster of the Brooklyn Dodgers camp school here by veteran George Sisler. There were 1440 accidents reported to the state the past week which included one fatality.
