AMMUNITION IS DRASTICALLY CUT

In a prepared statement Frank Parr, price panel chairman, said the war production board had allocated a quantity of materials to manufacturers for ammunition for civilian use equal to approximately one-sixth of the annual supply. "This means," he said, "that the demand for ammunition this fall will exceed the supply, and already the demand has created black market operations." Under OPA regulations, manufacturers and jobbers are required to furnish ceiling price schedules for the information of their customers.

Dairymen Facing Difficult Task

Ontario, Oct. 21—Although OPA has granted a few slight increases in milk prices to producers where the distributors were willing to absorb such increases, no action has been taken toward preserving that part of the dairy industry which has not yet been forced into liquidation. Director E. L. Peterson of the state department of agriculture pointed out in a recent statement.

A public hearing on the subject was held in the Moore Hotel in Ontario October 18.

In his statement Mr. Peterson urged that congress remove price restricted policies as they are now operative, or at least relax them. At the same time he pointed out that Oregon agriculture is unalterably opposed to the use of subsidies.

On the subject of milk, he declared that unless a relaxing in prices by OPA occurs, only further liquidation may be expected for the dairy industry. He deplored the present situation because "there is no way possible to bring back dairy production within four or five years' time once liquidation has taken place, due to the fact that animals must be raised from calves to replace those sold for slaughter." Mr. Peterson charges that those responsible for the food program, even though they say that dairy products are a prime essential and must be provided, are permitting the OPA, through its control of prices and its unbending attitude, to defeat their purpose.

In speaking of subsidies, Peterson declared, "The congress must make up its mind now whether or not the federal treasury is going to undertake the task of paying the grocery bills of 130 million Americans, as well as an undetermined number of countries."
