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JUVENILE DELINQUENCY DISCUSSED

Because of the wide-spread discussion and consideration of juvenile delinquency in Malheur county and other parts of Oregon, the warning and suggestions of a Minnesota convict are especially timely.

The convict is George S. Skaggs, 32, who was sentenced to the reformatory when he was 17 years old for car theft and is now serving a term for forgery.

As remedies of the crime situation, Skaggs suggests plenty of publicity, visiting of jails by school classes, showing of pictures of cell houses and penitentiaries and a "little lectures on the true facts about prison life, not to scare the youngsters, but to show them what a waste their lives can become".

Skaggs learned from talking to prisoners that many of them never knew anything about a jail until they were 17. Many of the convicts said if they had known what jail was like before they were 17 they would not be in prison now.

The sheriff to whom Skaggs made his suggestions is arranging with school officials to conduct an educational program on delinquency.

Persons entering into recent discussions in this vicinity largely blame individual parents for juvenile delinquency, but the problem is broader than that. Individual parents must share part of the blame, but also we are all to blame collectively for a condition that has developed from our present social and economic systems.

We circulate indecent magazines, show questionable pictures on the screen, allow children to roam the streets and permit existence of places of vice. We can't provide our children with one thrill after another and then expect them to be content with crocheting and playing mumble-peg. An individual parent should do his best to rear his children properly, but he has a difficult job with all the competition he has from the devil. If a couple economized to the point where they kept their finances in good condition, what effect would that action have on the national debt? The juvenile delinquency problem is comparable.

The only way the situation can be remedied is by parents doing their best with their own children and then cooperating with schools, churches and other organized groups to eliminate the temptations and provide clean recreation and amusements until the children are past the danger stage.

United Nations At War

RELIEF ADMINISTRATION ESTABLISHED

The United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration was formally established at a ceremony of signature at the White House November 9, and began its work last week in a conference in Atlantic City. Thirty-three United Nations invited to sign the agreement were: Australia, Belgium, Bolivia, Brazil, Canada, China, Costa Rica, Cuba, Czechoslovakia, Dominican Republic, El Salvador, Ethiopia, Great Britain, Greece, Guatemala, Haiti, Honduras, India, Iran, Iraq, Luxembourg, Mexico, Netherlands, New Zealand, Nicaragua, Norway, Panama, Philippines, Poland, Union of South Africa, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, United States, and Yugoslavia. The nations associated with the United Nations in this war, also invited to sign, were: Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, Egypt, Iceland, Liberia, Paraguay, Egypt, Uruguay, and Venezuela. The French Committee of National Liberation was also invited to sign.

GERMANS KILL

ITALIAN MULES

An American Division in the Italian mountain became the envy of others when it received 300 large mules to pack supplies and ammunition. As soon as the Germans realized that American Infantrymen were using the animals they began a systematic slaughter of all the Italian mules they could find.

SANTA CLAUS WITH AN AMERICAN ACCENT

Members of the Eighth Army Air force in England have opened a hobby shop. Here the boys spend their spare time making toys for English children—model tanks, fire trucks, cradles, Tommy-guns, little wooden locomotives, racing automobiles, with real windshields. The boys go to schools in poorer districts and ask the teachers which children need things and what they like most. The boys set a goal of 2400 toys to be made and stuffed with candy and gum from their weekly rations.

DANES BLOW UP GERMANS

When the Danish Admiral Vedel had given his order that the fleet was to be either scuttled or sailed to Sweden, a detachment of German Marines succeeded in getting on board the Danish Naval ship "Ingolf". The German Commander demanded 10 hostages as guarantee that the ship would not be blown up nor scuttled. The Captain of the "Ingolf" said, "I can't prevent you from taking the hostages but I must call your attention to the fact that the sea-cocks are already open." The Germans put their ten hostages in a row on the deck, when suddenly a signal sounded, the whole Danish crew, hostages and all, jumped overboard and deafening explosions shook the ship. Many of the Germans were killed or wounded but all the Danes escaped. This report came from the Stockholm newspaper, Dagens Nyheter. 19,000 REFUGEES NOW IN SWEDEN

Nineteen thousand Norwegian refugees are now in Sweden and 7,000 of them are earning their own way by working "in forest, agriculture, industry and road construction", according to an article in the Swedish newspaper, Dagens Nyheter. "The refugees offer a possibility for personal contact and a foundation for friendly Swedish-Norwegian relations that may be far more decisive for the future than theoretical political plans," the article commented.

TESTIFIED TO ACTIVITY OF FRENCH PATRIOTS

"There is growing proof of the faith, number and strength, and the activity of (French) patriots,"

said Commissioner of the Interior of the French National Liberation committee, in an interview upon his return to London. "Although winter is coming on, positions in the mountains are being held. There are nearly 80,000 men organized in hideouts at lower altitudes than during the summer. Thanks to the tremendous efforts which have been made to provide with clothing, provisions, and means of heating, we are hoping that they will get through his bad season in condition which are more or less bearable."

BRAZIL TO MAKE WAR MACHINES

Tanks, tractors, automobiles, and aviation motors will be manufactured in a factory 40 miles from Rio de Janeiro. The factory is already employing 2,500 persons, and within the coming year a city of 30,000 is expected to arise around it.

WILD ANIMALS PLAGUE NORWEGIANS

Bears, wolves, wolverines and foxes have staged such a comeback in Norway during the past three years that they have become a plague to the Norwegian farmers. Stripped of their firearms by Nazi order, the Norwegians are unable to combat the pests. Wolves formerly confined to northern Norway, have spread southward. One Gudbrandsdal farmer recently lost 35 sheep in a single night.

FARMERS FIGHT INVADERS

Netherlands farmers and livestock raisers, despite strong pressure by German occupation authorities, are continually evading requisition orders and sabotaging production in their attempts to keep vital food stocks out of Nazi hands. One of the most common tricks for farmers whose cattle has been animals from their pastures at night. Furthermore, harvesting has been done improperly on a large scale, with consequent spoilage, or diversion of produce to the "black" market. Nevertheless, they "save" as much as they can for local consumption, via the black market.

EIRE TO FURNISH CANNED BEEF

Ten firms in Eire expect to can a total of 22½ million pounds of beef, during the season ending

next March. This canned beef will be exported to the United Kingdom.

Victory Food Hints

"SERVE POTATOES DAILY"
We could almost substitute the saying, "A potato a day keeps the doctor away" for the one about the apple; but we would have to add, "if properly cooked", for very few of us eat our potatoes raw.

When cooking your potatoes, cook them in large chunks and in a small amount of water in order to retain those precious vitamins and minerals. Potatoes supply carbohydrates, protein, fat, calcium, phosphorus, iron, fibre, and vitamin A, B, C, and G.

The government is asking the homemaker to buy her potato supply for the winter now, thereby helping the storage problem and helping herself as well. Potatoes may be prepared in many tempting ways—this recipe will call for a second.

SAVORY POTATOES
3 cups potatoes cooked with jackets and cut in strips.
2 small onions, cut in rings.
4 T shortening
2 T all purpose enriched flour.
1½ cups top milk or thin cream.
1 T salt
¼ tsp. pepper
paprika

Cut the potatoes into match-like strips. Brown the onion rings in the shortening. Add the flour, stirring thoroughly. Add the top milk, salt, and pepper and cook on low until the mixture thickens. Combine the potatoes and sauce. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake in moderate oven for 15 minutes.
