That said proposed road district is located in the County of Malheur, State of Oregon, which said County has an area of more than 9,000 square miles and more than 10,000 inhabitants;

One of the last acts of Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle before his death was to legally advise Senator Frederick S. Lamport that both he and Senator John H. Carson continue their pro tempore status as members of the state senate until November 1946, unless the senators for which they were named as substitutes are released from military service before that time.

If you skip breakfast and eat skimpy meals you will be more conscious of the cold.

Grains and the foods made from grains are among our better fuel foods. Four Square Pudding is one energy food and also a money saver.

#### "FOUR SQUARE PUDDING"

6 slices day-old bread

butter

1/2 cup raisins

1/4 cup shredded bran cereal

2 egg yolks

2 tablespoons sugar

1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

2 cups milk

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

2 egg whites

4 tablespoons sugar

Remove crusts from bread; spread with butter; cut into squares and arrange in layers in greased baking dish. Sprinkle each layer with raisins and bran cereal. Beat egg yolks; add sugar, nutmeg, milk and flavoring; mix thoroughly and pour over bread. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) about 35 minutes. Cover with meringue made from two stiffly beaten egg whites and 4 tablespoons sugar. Bake in slow oven (300 degrees) about 20 minutes or until meringue is brown.

Yield: 8 servings (8-inch baking dish.)
