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JAP TREATMENT AROUSES AMERICANS

A printed bombshell dropped on the United States shattered American complacency last week when the army and navy announced the atrocities perpetrated by the Japanese on the captured heroes of Bataan and Corregidor. No single act has so aroused the American people since the sneak attack on Pearl harbor as the details of the treatment administered by the Japs to the American prisoners. Had the atrocities been published several months ago when they occurred they would have attracted less attention, because their release for publication now means that the announcement was made for a purpose. The purpose is known only to certain government officials.

Some congressmen feel that the release was printed with a view of causing the Japanese to desist from their cruel treatment of prisoners. It may have the opposite effect, because the Japanese have reverted to barbarism and seem to take pride in it.

One of the sad features of the release is that it will cause relatives of men and women held by the Japs more anxiety over their welfare.

Another effect will be that the American people will come to the realization of what kind of an enemy they are fighting, and if their memory is not too short, will demand ample punishment for the perpetrators of the crimes, including the emperor of Japan and the present leader of the militarists, Premier Tojo.

The American people should also realize that after the war the Japs should be confined to their small group of islands off the coast of China and kept there, where they can be trained to work for peace and not war.

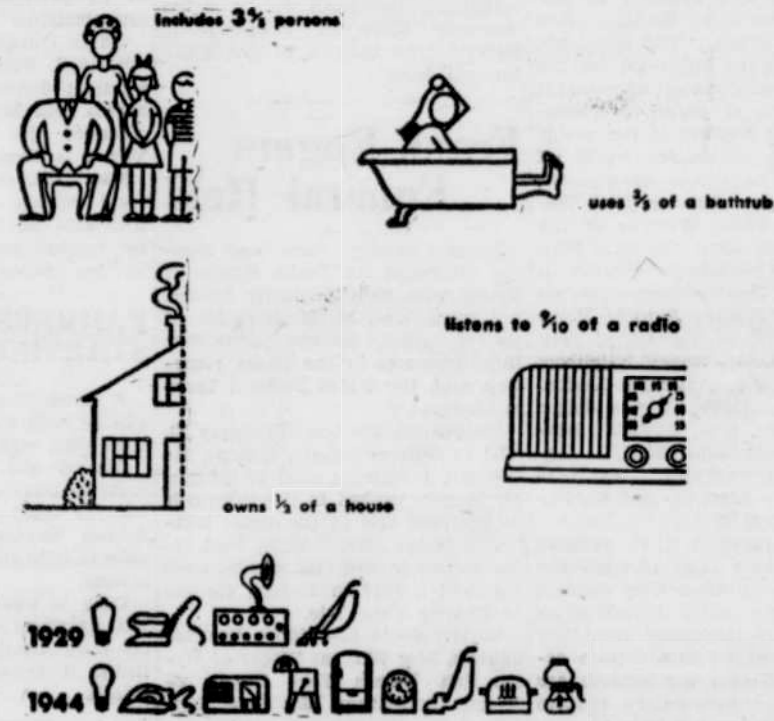
