UPON THE ORGANIZATION
OF NYSSA ROAD ASSESSMENT
DISTRICT. NOTICE HEREBY IS
GIVEN, that upon 25 and more,
owners of land lying in a contiguous
body, filing with the County
Court a petition proposing the
organization of a road assessment
district, and after hearing on said
petition, and no persons appearing
to object to the boundaries of such
district as proposed, or the inclusion
of any lands therein, and by
order of the County Court of Malheur
County, Oregon, duly made and
entered in its journal, the County
Court has called and there will be
held within the boundaries of the
proposed district, an election upon
the question of whether or not such
district shall be organized under
the provisions of Chapter 392, Oregon
Laws, 1943.

Such election will be held at the
Nyssa Grade School Building in the
City of Nyssa, Malheur County,
Oregon, on the 26th day of February
1944, between the hours of
9 o'clock A.M. and 6 o'clock P.M.
of said day.

At said election only resident
owners of real property within the
district as shown by the last county
assessment on which he or she is
liable or subject to pay a tax and
who has resided within the boundaries
of the proposed district for more
than 30 days, immediately prior
to the time of the election, shall
be entitled to vote.

At said election there shall be
elected three directors whose terms
shall expire in one, two and three
years, respectively, from the first
Monday in July next succeeding

their election, and their respective
term shall be decided by lot.

Nominations for the three directors shall be made by petition, signed by at least 10 qualified electors within the proposed district, which nominating petition shall be filed with the County Clerk at least 10 days prior to the time of the election.

The ballots to be used at said election will contain a blank line thereon for the voter to write in the name of any candidate voted for.

The name of the proposed district is NYSSA ROAD ASSESSMENT DISTRICT, and the boundaries of said proposed district are as follows: Beginning at a point where the half section line running East and West through Section 33, Township 18, S. Range 46, E.W.M., intersects the West bank of the Snake River, thence running due West on the half section line through Sections 33, 32 and 31, Township 18, S. Range 46, E.W.M., and on half section line through Section 36, Township 18, S. Range 46, E.W.M., to the western boundary line of Section 36, Township 18, S. Range 46; thence southerly along the western boundary line of Section 36, Township 18, S. Range 46 to the north boundary line of Section 36, Township 18, S. Range 46 to the north boundary line of Section 2, Township 19, S. 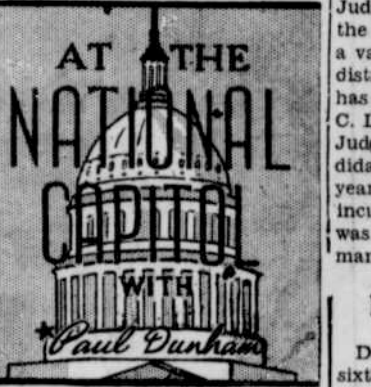
