



URBAN HARVESTERS

At the annual convention of the Oregon Seed Growers League held in the capital last week Supervisor of Farm Labor J. R. Beck said, "Urban residents assisting in meeting the farm labor problem during the last harvest season did a tremendous job, they nevertheless are faced with a much heavier one during the coming year and more and more responsibility will fall on them if the armed forces and civilians are to be given an adequate food supply."

The fact that more and more regular labor is being called by the draft and this will multiply as the harvests approach, will make it essential that even a greater supply of the labor must come from the schools, shops, stores and offices than ever before.

STATE BUYS BIG

Governor Earl Snell has announced the state bond commission voted to buy with state funds \$4,000,000 worth of government bonds in the fourth war loan drive. Governor Snell said the commission regarded the purchase as a good investment and were eager to assist in the fourth war loan drive.

STATE POLICE RECORDS

State police during the past month arrested 1315 persons and warned 3117 others for violating motor vehicle laws, fines and sentences for these offenses totaling \$10,812 1312 days in jail. There were 30 arrests for drunken driving, 235 for general crimes. There were 64 arrests and 51 warnings for game law violations and four arrests and 12 warnings for violation of the commercial fishing laws.

SHORTENS TICKET

As predicted in this column several weeks ago, Frederick S. Lamport and John H. Carson, senators pro tem of Marion county will serve in the 1945 legislature. Douglas McKay and Allen G. Carson were elected for four year terms from Marion county. Both are in service. Their terms expire November 5, 1946. According to the recent ruling by Attorney General Neuner, Lamport and Carson may serve the terms of the senators in service or until their return.

THREE IN DEATH CELLS

In the death cells at the state penitentiary a white man and two negroes are awaiting execution of sentence.

The three have filed appeals with the Oregon supreme court and the court has confirmed the conviction of one, Harvey Cunningham, Portland negro who shot and killed Richard Kerr two years ago.

The other negro is Robert E. Lee Folkes, convicted of slaying Mrs. Martha Virginia James on a Southern Pacific passenger train in Linn county a year ago.

The white man is Richard H. Layton, 36 year old former Monmouth, Oregon, city marshal who was convicted of the murder of Ruth Hilderbrand, 17 year old Dallas school girl.

OVERLOAD CHECK

The new policy adopted recently by the state to check persistent and chronic violators of the law regarding overloading of logging and commercial trucks resulted from the failure of the fining system as a corrective measure. State police will enforce the law by requiring violators to pull off the highway and remove overloads then report the violator to the OPA which will subject the offender to reduced gasoline allotments. The last legislature boosted weight limits from 54,000 to 71,000 pounds and length limits from 60 to 70 feet. The overload problem must be solved if the highways are to last for the duration.

JUVENILE CORRECTION

Governor Earl Snell's juvenile delinquency committee has submitted a policy for his approval including an offer to serve as a clearing house for juvenile problems and would cooperate with existing agencies, not replace them.

The committee recommended, (1) appointment of a field secretary, (2) all Oregon counties obtain juvenile consultants to provide counsel and guidance, (3) enforce the 1940 act which requires separate custody for juvenile wrongdoers.

LAND BANK IS BUYING BONDS

An investment of \$9000 in war bonds by the Federal Land bank of Spokane has been credited to Malheur county, H. J. Davis, secretary-treasurer of the Payette Group National Farm Loan association, revealed.

The bank has just invested \$3,000,000 in bonds as its part in the fourth war loan drive. R. E. Brown, president, advised Mr. Davis. Each of the four states served by the bank, Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon, has been credited with \$500,000 and \$1,000,000 has been credited to the city of Spokane, headquarters of the bank.
