PRICE SUPPORT COSTS

Total costs to Commodity Credit programs during 1943 amounted to \$350,000,000, CCC President J. B. Hutton has informed congress. The programs cover seven commodities—day beans, potatoes, raisins and prunes, canning vegetables, sugar, dairy products and oilseeds and products. The increase in prices which would be necessary to eliminate these losses to Commodity Credit without reducing returns to farmers probably would add \$625,000,000 to consumers' 1943 food expenditures, Hutton said. At the same time, higher prices for the commodities covered would have increased government food expenditures by \$125,000,000 to \$150,000,000.

BETTER PASTURES

Better pastures are the objective of many soil building practices under the 1944 AAA program. Payments will be made for clearing mowing, seeding, liming, and drainage to improve pasture lands. These payments are in line with an effort to increase dairy production, reduce production costs, increase protein supply and produce a better long time agriculture. County AAA offices are furnishing operators with details concerning these practices and place producers in line to receive payment for practices performed.

CROP INSURANCE RESERVES

During the five years of the federal wheat crop insurance program, now discontinued by federal legislation, Oregon wheat growers have built up a reserve of 331,566 bushels of wheat. This reserve represents the balance remaining in premiums paid in over the amount paid out to farmers for losses.

Total premiums collected were 844,139 bushels, covering a guaranteed production of 15,918, 813 bushels on 1,080,948 acres. Indemnities for losses amounted to 512,573 bushels. Under the present status of the program, the reserve will be absorbed by the Federal Crop Insurance corporation for payment of losses in other states.

WEED CONTROL

Weed control in Oregon should hit a new high in 1944 as a result of the unlimited allowance under the AAA conservation practice program. Payment to farmers for control by clean cultivation or chemicals of certain perennial noxious weeds is not limited. Farmers wishing to qualify for such assistance must secure prior approval from their county AAA office. Filed inspections will be made to assure strict compliance with approved control measures.

Victory Food Hints

"HEALTHFUL DESSERT"
Does your family shun vegetables and gobbie dessert? Here's a sure way to fool them into eating vegetables and enjoying their dessert, all in one.

A lemon sauce to top a steamed carrot pudding would add even more to this already crammed-full-of-vitamins and minerals dish.

Besides, this time of the year our vitality is at low-tide and we need pepper-uppers to keep us ready for the busy days ahead.

STEAMED CARROT PUDDING

2 tablespoons shortening
1 cup sifted flour
1 teaspoon soda
½ teaspoon salt
1 cup sugar
1 teaspoon cloves
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon nutmeg
2 teaspoons grated lemon rind
1 cup shredded raw carrots
1 cup shredded raw potatoes
1 cup raisins
1 cup chopped nutmeats
Cream shortening, sift dry ingredients together and combine with shortening. Mix in remaining ingredients. Fill oiled 2-quart pudding mold two-thirds full. Cover with waxed paper and steam 1 hour. Yield: 10-12 servings.

LONG AGAIN SETS TRAPPING RECORD

Robert E. (Pud) Long is reported to have recently broken that record which he has set and broken so often, when he killed 621 coyotes in one month last fall in Malheur county. The sale of his one month's collection of pelts amounted to more than \$6000.

Long, now an ex-employee of the United States Fish and Wildlife service, is well known in eastern Oregon for his expert ability in the control of predatory animals by trapping, shooting and poisoning them as they go about their marauding of livestock and game. He was at one time loaned to the Civilian Conservation Corps for the purpose of training boys of that organization in the art of predatory animal control. Several

of his students made names for themselves later by proving their abilities along that line to the state and federal governments.

Long's record not only proves that he is an expert in his field but also shows that the coyote population is on the increase and action must be taken for its control. Other reports have been received that coyotes are in abundance everywhere in the eastern part of the state this winter, and are presenting a serious problem.—Eastern Oregon Observer.

To Vote You Must Be Registered

As provided by Chapter 204, 1927 Laws, no person shall be qualified to vote at a Primary, General or Special Election unless he or she shall be registered.

Election cannot be sworn in to vote on election day.

Registration books are now open and will be open until the night of April 18, 1944.

If you were registered and did not vote at either the Primary or General Election in 1942, or have changed your residence or if you desire to change your political affiliations, you must re-register.
