There is one field in which tradition is never broken, even by President Roosevelt and that field is in the realm of politics. Practically everyone in Washington denies playing politics, but everyone knows that if the president were not playing politics during wartime he would deny any fourth term aspirations, or at least say what he intends to do.

Conduct of this war is too important a matter to be interfered with by politics, but such a statement is not going to influence some of our politicians.

OUR APPIAN WAY
 When in Oregon do as the Romans do—if you are building a highway. That's what State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock did on a 25-mile section of highway between LaGrande and Pendleton.
 The Appian Way, an ancient road to Rome which is an objective of allied troops who are moving inland from Nettuno, served as a model for Oregon roadbuilding in the Blue mountains where modern technique did not produce satisfactory results. "The old Romans went right down to hardpan and built from there," Baldock says. "We were troubled with ground conditions on the Old Oregon Trail. We found 'frost boils' ruined ordinary highway surface, so we used the same general type of construction as the old Romans and have had good results."
OREGON WAR PRISONERS
 The war prisoners aid association, a branch of the Y.M.C.A., reports there are 360 Oregon service men who are prisoners of war.
 Charles A. Sprague, president of Oregon war chest says, "The organization, which has 100 representatives working in prison camps, shipped 500,000 pounds of recreational and cultural material to war prisoners last year, including books, sports equipment and musical equipment."
SUPREME COURT ON DIVORCE
 In a case where each party sued for divorce the state supreme court has just held that both were at fault and neither is entitled to a divorce.
 The opinion of Judge Vandenberg, of the 13th district, granting a divorce to the woman in the case, was reversed in the high courts opinion, written by Justice James T. Brand.
GUBERNATORIAL APPOINTMENTS
 Governor Earl Snell has appointed Claude W. Barrick, Tillamook, district attorney pro tem for Tillamook county, replacing Warren McMinimee, who obtained a leave of absence to enter the navy. The governor also appointed Dr. O. T. Wherry, Portland, as dentist member of the state board of health succeeding Dr. C. M. Harrison, Portland who resigned.
OREGON CURRENT
 The Japanese current should be renamed the Oregon current asserts H. R. Richards, president of the farm rate council of Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

GOT A QUEEN BEE
 Oregon honey bees are having the best winter since Axis activities disturbed normal food supplies, according to a report made by State Apiary Supervisor A. Burr Black. Only about three percent of the 17,338 colonies of bees in the state are affected by foulbrood, the destructive bee disease. As a result of the shortage of queen bees the price has gone up from 10 to 15 percent.
CAPITAL SHORTS
 Altho the announced candidacy of Wayne L. Morse for U. S. Senator has the support of the federation of labor a third candidate is expected to file. Morse has resigned as public member of the War Labor board and as dean of the University of Oregon. Three inmates of state institutions escaped the past week, two from Fairview home and one from the state hospital. Only three-fourths of Oregon's motor vehicles have registered for 1944 altho 35,000 more have registered than in January 1943. There were 1186 industrial accidents this month.
