A.F. INSTRUMENT INSTRUCTOR'S SCHOOL, BRYAN, TEXAS, Jan. 27—Pvt. Walter L. Ashby, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Ashby, route 2, Nyssa, has completed an eight week instrument trainer instructor's course at Bryan Field, the only school of its kind in the air force training command.

The highly technical course, an outgrowth of revisions in teaching instrument flying, is a combined refresher and advanced program for enlisted men stationed at operational bases throughout the United States as instructors in link

WOMEN MARINES TO BE HONORED

Oregon's chief executive released a letter this week from Salem requesting the people of Oregon to observe marine corps women's reserve first anniversary. Governor Snell states that "fitting tribute should be paid the women marines during this week of national observance, and particularly on the birthday of this branch of the service, February 13."

During this commemorative week, a typical Oregon enlistee will be honored. Based on averages, the representative lady marine is a medium brown-haired woman of 21 years. She has blue eyes, weighs 127 pounds and is sixty-four and a quarter inches in height. Miss Average Marine has a normal vision and has never worn glasses. Obviously, she is not color-blind! Among other distinctions, she is fair-complexioned, comes from a family established for years in Oregon and is a high school graduate with some college training.

The Oregon woman marine has been a stenographer for a year and is single-minded as to marital status. Her written reason for enlisting is greatly influenced by the recruiting literature which shouts: "Free a Marine to Fight!"
