SCHOOL CONFORMED

Approximately 1000 emergency

certificates have been issued to

Oregon teachers since June 1, 1943.

This means that there has been

need for almost 1000 more teachers

than could meet regular certifi-

cation requirements. In spite of the teacher shortage, no Oregon child, to the knowledge of the State Department of Education, is going without education. Many schools have consolidated and others are transporting their children to other districts to make educational opportunity available.

CAPITAL SHORTS

State Budget Director George Aiken is in Reno to represent Governor Snell at a conference of western state and federal officials to consider post-war plans.

State police recovered 550 stolen autos in 1943. Weekly newspapers outdied the dailies 25 percent in donating space to war winning drives the past year.

FARMERS SEEKING CROP FINANCING

A. D. Stanton, field supervisor for the emergency crop and feed loan office, stated that farmers of Malheur county are now applying for loans to finance the production of their 1944 crops. Applications for loans are now being written in the county agent's office at Ontario. He stated that, in addition to financing the production of regular crops such as grain and hay, loans were also being made for the production of those crops declared essential to and so vitally needed in the war effort this year. Plans for 1944 call for increased production of many food crops. The production goals for these crops, which can be successfully planted and grown in Malheur county should be met, and the need for funds necessary for their production will be given special consideration with the view that credit will be extended, wherever needed, so that no farm family will be denied an opportunity to make its maximum contributions to the food production program.

Emergency crop loans are available to farmers, either owners or tenants, who own or can make arrangements for land to farm, who own or have the use of necessary workstock and equipment with which to farm, and who can give as security a first lien on the crops to be financed. These loans will be made to farmers whose cash requirements are relatively small and who are unable to obtain loans from other sources, including local banks and production credit associations.

Loans are also available for the purchase or production to feed for livestock whose products will be marketed, for livestock to be fed for the market or for breeding animals with the increase to be marketed, but, as security, a first lien on such livestock is required.

Mr. Stanton emphasized that these loans are not restricted to selected applicants but are available to all farmers who can establish eligibility, according to the terms of the loan regulations and the authorizing act of congress. Mr. Stanton is in Oregon each Wednesday.

FOOD FALLACIES TO BE DISCUSSED

Fads, fallacies and superstitions about foods will be revealed at the next Health for Victory meeting to be held Friday Mar. 3 at 2 o'clock in the high school building. Mrs. Anderson, Home Demonstrator for the Idaho Power company, announced.

"We are going to discuss a lot of oldtime beliefs that still prevent many people from eating certain foods that are essential to good health," Mrs. Anderson explained. "Also, we are going to point out how these same false theories cause waste of foods."

As an example, the home demonstrator referred to the idea that "milk sours whenever thunder cracks." This belief, she explained, could lead a housewife to throw away all the milk she had in a refrigerator if she subscribed to this ancient superstition.

Mrs. Anderson also pointed out that at the next Health for Victory nutrition meeting she would explode certain false rumors about present-day food conditions in America. "One is the rumor that we have large surpluses of food and there is no need to practice wartime food economy. This is completely false, and the fact is that only if we civilians practice strict food economy will there be enough to satisfy our food needs for good nutrition. Even though most of our lend-lease food is going to England and Russia, this amount of food is only 10 per cent of our total supply."

Health Program of '44 Covered

Plans for a full health program for 1944 occupied the attention of the executive committee of the Malheur County Public Health association at its monthly meeting in Nyssa, Saturday morning. Tentative plans were made for use of the X-ray for tuberculin testing on a much wider scale than has ever before been attempted in the county.

The Oregon Tuberculosis association is basing its early diagnosis campaign (an educational campaign for teaching the public how to discover the disease in its early stages) on the value of X-rays for every individual, pointing out the superiority of this method over that

of skin testing.

Several permanent clinics are being arranged. Mrs. Edna Farris, R. N., county nurse, told the committee, and will be held monthly at various places through out the county for infants and pre-school children. The association will assist with the clinic program as well as with an intensified immunization program. Funds from the sale of Christmas seals, now nearing the \$4000 mark will provide for a better public health program than the county has previously been able to afford.

Dennis W. Patch, president of the association spoke in terms of high praise for the work of the seal sale committee. "Probably every committee member has found that greater demands were put upon his time and energy this year than for many years previous," Mr. Patch said, "yet no one failed to do his or her part in pushing our county's anti-tuberculosis drive. We should all see to it that there is no let-up in our health education drive and that this money is spent to insure the greatest possible advancement of community health."

Christmas Seal contributions are still coming in, Mrs. Charles S. Harris, county chairman, said this week. "A good many people overlook the returns for the seals sent them during the holiday rush," she said, "and later when they have more leisure, hand the money to their community chairman. We only have \$300 to go to make our total \$4000 and we are hoping these late returns will accomplish this. No amount is too little or too late."

The Malheur County Public Health association retains 75 percent of

the funds obtained from the sale of Christmas seals for public health betterment in Malheur county. Twenty per cent of the total goes to the Oregon Tuberculosis association and five percent is sent to the National Tuberculosis association to further its extensive research program.
