which many hundreds of the great, the near great and the humble paid him their last tribute. He was a member of the U.S. senate for nearly twenty-six years, one of the longest and most distinguished records of the congress. In 1940 he was a candidate for the vice presidency.

The funeral services were conducted by Bishop Bruce Baxter who paid eloquent tribute to Senator McNary's many years of service to his country and described him as "a genuinely modest man" who "would deplore extravagant praise." "First of all," said Dr. Baxter, "was his unswerving devotion to duty. He stayed by his work when others rested. He stayed by that work when the interests of health required that he also rest. He was a power for good in his nation—a war casualty as truly as any boy who falls in battle."

POTENTIAL CANDIDATES
The double-barreled announcement made by Governor Earl Snell naming Guy Gordon as interim U.S. senator and that he, the governor, would not be a candidate for the unexpired four-year term—left a panorama of potential candidates. It is natural that those who were proposed for appointment should be looked on as apt to seek nomination, among them: Wm. G. Hare, former member of the state senate where he was known as "Brother Eloquence"; Merle Chessman, editor of the Astorian-Budget and state senator; P. J. Stadelman, industrialist of The Dalles. Charles A. Sprague, former governor is expected to file for the four year term also.

Pretty, brunette Dorothy May Mott is on the romantic beam here at the capitol. Congressman and Mrs. James Mott have announced her engagement to Mr. Benjamin Murray Whisenand son of Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Whisenand of Bend. The benedict-elect is enrolled in the navy V-12 program and is attending Willamette University.

BIOGRAPHY OF NEW U.S. SENATOR
Guy Gordon Oregon's new U.S. senator is 53 years of age and was

born in Texas but has been a resident of Oregon for 53 years. He was married to Ana Allen in Roseburg in 1914. There are three children, Allen, a lieutenant in the army air forces, Carolyn and Margaret, students at the University of Oregon.

From 1916 to 1919 Gordon served as county assessor of Douglas county and was district attorney from 1923 to 1926. He served in field artillery in World War I and was commander of the Oregon department of the American Legion in 1936. He is a member of the Elks and Masonic lodges.

DRAFT CHECK UP
Elmer V. Wooton, selective service director for Oregon has sent all draft boards in the state a bulletin directing them to immediately review all occupational classifications, particularly involving agriculture and industry, so as to obtain additional men under 26 years of age. Replacement schedules also will be reviewed by the draft boards under Wooton's directive.

Wooton indicated that the classification review program in Oregon probably would not result obtaining any appreciable number of additional men for the army and navy because Oregon is one of the few states in the union that has complied with the quota requirements since the war started.

MC INTYRE PROMOTED
Dr. Ross T. McIntyre, formerly of Salem, has been named as vice admiral by President Roosevelt. This appointment makes McIntyre Navy Surgeon General and chief of the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery. He is also personal physician to the president.

CAPITAL SHORTS
About 5000 persons are attending war production classes of the state department of vocational training. State officials have asked the government to dispose of surplus stocks through regular trade channels.

Victory Food Hints

"IT'S HOT CROSS BUN TIME"
Lenten season reminds us of Hot Cross Buns and if you don't have a good standard recipe I'm sure you'll want to try this one. It's easy on sugar and shortening and can be kept in your refrigerator for three or four days once the dough is made. Divide the dough and treat your family to two Hot Cross Bun days.

"HOT CROSS BUNS"
1 cup milk, scalded
1/2 cup sugar
2 tablespoons shortening
1 teaspoon salt
1 cake yeast
1/4 cup lukewarm water
1 egg
3 1/2 cups sifted enriched flour (approximately)
3/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 cup currants or raisins
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
Pour hot milk over sugar, shortening and salt. Cool to lukewarm. Dissolve yeast in lukewarm water and add to cooled milk. Add beaten egg. Add cinnamon to half the flour, sift, and add to milk mixture. Beat well. Blend in currants or raisins, grated lemon rind and remaining flour to make stiff dough. Knead lightly.

Place dough in greased bowl, cover and let rise in warm place until double in bulk. Turn out on floured board, knead lightly and form into balls an inch and a half in diameter. Place buns on oiled baking sheet, brush lightly with slightly beaten egg white and allow to rise until triple in bulk. With scissors, snip tops to form a cross. Bake in 400 degree oven for 15 minutes. To remaining egg white, add confectioner's sugar to make medium-thick frosting and paint a cross with pastry brush on each bun. (Makes 2 dozen.)

DAIRY PAYMENTS HIGHER
Announcement of continuation of the dairy production payment program at increased rates for March and April has been received by the county AAA committee, which issues payments to county producers. Rates for March and April will be substantially higher, 60 cents a hundred weight for whole milk and 8 cents a pound for butterfat.

The county committee is now receiving applications for payments

on February production. February payments will be at the previously announced rates of 35 cents a hundredweight for whole milk and 5 cents a pound for butterfat.

entative plans contemplate that a season reduction will be made in the rates for the months of May through August, the committee has been informed.

COLD PACK CANNEDS
Another bright spot in the home canning picture is the announcement by the war production board that 500,000 new enameled cold pack canners are being manufactured and will be on the market during the next several months. No new canners have been made since 1941.

APRIL OILMEAL SET ASIDE
Processors of oil seed meal have been ordered to set aside 20 per cent of their April production—as they have for the past three months—for directed distribution by WFA.

Since present feed mixing facilities are believed adequate, WFA has asked that no new feed mixing plants be installed without prior application for protein meal quotas. Although the necessity for replacement equipment is recognized, WFA officials point out that installation of new equipment with larger capacity will not constitute a basis for increased quotas.

OREGON FARMS AID RED ARMY
Farm folks in this country, especially Oregon, can take added satisfaction from Russia's inroads on Hitler's armies with the realization that they have added punch to the Russian drive with food trucks and seed.

Large quantities of food of the kinds produced on Oregon farms have gone from this country to maintain the Soviet army rations. They have consisted chiefly of wheat and flour, dried peas and beans, sugar, meat in canned cured and dehydrated forms, powdered milk, dried eggs, dehydrated vegetables, and substantial quantities of lard, pork fat, and vegetable oils. Our 580,000 tons of fats and oils were especially important during the winter, offensives carried on in sub-zero weather. We put 3 1/2 per cent of our total food supply in 1943 into the Russian offensives.

Oregon contributed substantially amounts of nearly all of the foodstuffs sent, and the state's farmers can take a larger measure of credit for rye grass, vetch and vegetable seeds which helped to make a total of 9,000 tons of seeds sent the Russians from this country in 1943. Also, by keeping old trucks in service, farmers contributed toward the 170,000 trucks sent to help meet the advancing Red army's transport and supply problems.

WOOL FIGURES
Production of wool in 1943 totaled 10,471,000 pounds in Oregon and 447,978,000 pounds in the U.S., a decrease from 1943 for both the state and nation. The Oregon market price of 1943 shorn wool averaged

40 cents a pound, which was up 15 cents from the 1942 average price. The number of sheep shorn in the state is estimated at 1,277,000 head in 1943, down 175,000 head from the number shorn in 1942.

The Bureau of agricultural economics says farmers probably would have received lower prices in 1943 for wool if no support programs had been available, as comparable grades of foreign wool were readily available at lower prices. Army orders, which provide the chief outlet for domestic wools, declined sharply in 1943. The WFA has announced that it will offer to purchase the 1944 domestic production of wool at the 1943 price, which is the current ceiling price less specific marketing costs.

Only two weeks remain in which county farmers can report soil building and conservation practices performed to qualify for payment under the 1943 AAA program, the county AAA committee warns. March 31 is the closing date.
