Plans Outlined For Farm Labor

adequately from 1,200 to 1,400 farm laborers will be required.

For the purpose of obtaining farm labor the Malheur county farm labor committee is asking for sponsors to form the Malheur county farm labor sponsoring committee, a corporation which will be responsible for sponsoring the labor brought in for planting and harvesting of crops. Each sponsor will advance 10 cent per acre for his irrigated land on the farm, the proceeds of this advance to be used in offsetting a guarantee of 75 percent employment and subsistence during the 25 percent of time that the laborer is under contract. In addition to this certain funds will be required to administer the business of the committee. Sponsors will draw on the labor supply first. Non-sponsors will be taken care of as labor is available. Each sponsor will be charged an additional 10 cent per day and the non-sponsor will be charged 25 cents per man per day, during the days that his labor is employed. Any balance of funds will be pro-rated back to those who sponsor or have used the available labor.

An opportunity will be provided for those wishing to join the sponsors' list to contact the respective farm labor committee members as follows: Vale, Glen Hutchinson; Nyssa, George Daley, P. Tensen, Ira Ure; Ontario, R. E. Brooke, county agent's office; Oregon Slope, Harold Gribben. Any of these committee members will accept names of sponsors to make up the committee and will take up in detail the plan as set up. March 25 has been set as the last day for signing the sponsors' list.

ONTARIO TAKES 1ST IN CONTEST

Klamath Falls, Pendleton, Ontario and Warrenton were first place winners in the 1943 Oregon Cities Traffic Safety contest, according to Bob Farrell, Secretary of State and Sponsor of the contest.

The four first place winners will receive sets of highway plaques which will be erected alongside highway entrances to the four cities. In addition, they and other high winners will receive certificates of award for display in local city offices.

"I congratulate the winning cities on their fine record in accident prevention during the past year," Farrell declared, in announcing the awards. "These awards are based on improvement in the accident experience of the past year, compared to the previous three-year average for each city."

Dean Allen started the university's first courses in journalism in the fall of 1912, and the whole growth of the small department into a large and important school was under his leadership and direction.

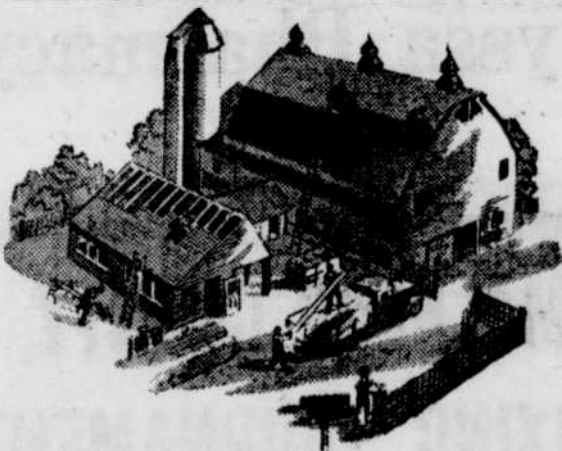
