



Washington, D. C., March 30—Several members of the northwest delegations in congress have introduced bills during the past year which, if enacted into law, will cause the government to pay taxes to the many counties for the large amount of land the federal government has acquired for military purposes. These lands have been taken off the local tax rolls which, in turn, has worked a financial hardship on many communities in both Washington and Oregon.

One such bill (S-240) was introduced by the late Senator Charles L. McNary, who had labored long and hard for the many counties and other political subdivisions which have lost substantial tax revenues. Senator McNary was deeply interested in this bill, now on the senate calendar, which provides that all real property acquired by the government for war purposes since January, 1940, shall remain subject to taxation by the states and counties in which it is located.

Senator Guy Gordon, who has been actively interested in tax matters for many years and who is regarded as an authority on taxes, will take over the reins on the McNary bill. Senator Gordon believes

the measure has a good chance to pass. If so, it will mean substantial relief for many counties in the two states.

Two nationally known bottlers of mineral and sparkling waters are looking over sites in the northwest for plants they intend to establish after the war. The northwest has many mineral springs which produce several kinds of excellent waters. These easterners are amazed at the lack of promotion and development of western springs, which they say compare favorably with any others in the nation. Analyses of these northwest springs prove them to be tops of their kind. A large eastern glass and bottle manufacturer is also interested in the deal. If these industries are established it will mean enormous national advertising for the northwest and its mineral waters.

All hand agree that a much simpler income tax form will come out of the new tax mess, especially one for the little fellow. The last federal form was as bad as a Chinese puzzle, which a Philadelphia lawyer couldn't figure out properly.
