ATTENTION CADETS

Oregon will have a vacancy at the United States Military academy West Point, N.Y. to be filled in 1945. To determine the eligible can- didates the civil service commis- sion will hold a preliminary qualif- ying examination on July 29, 1944, open to all candidates from the first congressional district within eligible age—from the day they are 17 to the day they are 22 years of age, on which latter day they are not eligible. A principal for the West Point appointment and three alternates will be selected at the same time.

HOSPITAL EXONERATED

A coroner's jury investigating the death of Ervin Wakefield, a patient in the criminal insane ward at the state hospital, following a riot there last week, held the hospital officials and staff blameless. Andrew Trimpey, the attendant who is al- leged to have struck Wakefield over the head in subduing the patient after he had run amuck armed with a homemade blackjack, was com- mended by the jury "for bravery and action in risking his life be- yond the requirements of his duty." Two other patients and two hospi- tal attendances were injured in the riot.

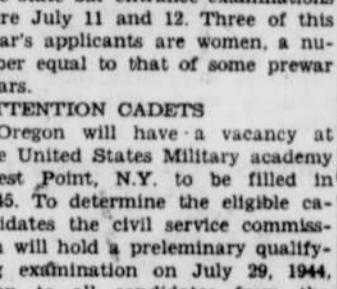
