STEINER ACTING GOVERNOR

The past week here at the capital was comparatively quiet. Acting Governor W. H. Steiner, president of the senate, conducted state business of the executive department by mail and telephone from his home in Fossil. He appointed Dr. V. P. Morris of Eugene, C. W. Pecore and Mrs William Klutzer, the latter two of Portland, as members of the recently created merit system council.

Governor Earl Snell who is in Hershey, Pa, attending the national governors conference appointed Mrs Merideth Bailey of Sisters, Oregon, a member of the Oregon State Library Board of Trustees for a five-year term beginning June 2 and Mr W. W. Parsons of Baker, Oregon, for a five-year term as a member of the Oregon Board of Pharmacy.

CRIME GRAPH UNCHANGED

A slight increase in juvenile crime and a similar decrease in crimes by mature persons has kept crime records where they were before the war. Fifty-seven members of the Oregon state police have entered the military service with a substantial number in combat war zones. According to the annual report of Charles P. Pray, superintendent of state police, 107 employees largely field operatives, have resigned, died or entered military service.

Records of the department show a number of outstanding functions of the department resulting from the war. One is seeking out black markets, another, the investigation of ration regulation violators and a third providing convoys for military units passing through the state.

FEDERAL FUNDS FADE

Oregon's allocation of federal funds for post-war highway construction may be cut in half said R. H. Baldoek, state highway engineer, upon his return from Washington, D. C. this week. A bill just introduced in congress would cut in half Oregon's allocated \$1,000,000 a year for three years. A bill introduced by Rep. James Mott, of Oregon, would restore the original allocations, plus federal road funds.

FLAX AID LAX

Days of state paternalism for the flax industry as a whole are past in Oregon, at least for the duration of the war, the state board of control has intimated as it instructed the state flax expert to take from his calling list nine flax plants in which the state has no stake. He was, however, authorized to travel to any plant in the state where his services should be requested.

The action grew out of a study of mileage figures, showing that approximately 8,000 of the more than 18,000 miles he drove last year were to and from other plants.

STATES RIGHTS

"With 50 per cent of the land of western states federally owned and with the government holdings gradually being enlarged, it is high time that congress recognize the inequalities of the tax situation and pass remedial legislation", says Earl Day, member of the state tax commission. He points to the taking off the tax rolls the land secured for the operation of Camp Adair. This meant that 50 per cent of the valuation of property values was lost to 10 school districts, however, all services, including education, schools and law enforcement must be maintained.

RETURNS SLOW

Ten days after the primary election of May 19 only one-half of Oregon's counties had reported complete returns to the secretary of state. Canvas of votes is expected to be completed by June 3rd, according to David O'Hara, head of the elections division of state.

HORSELESS COWBOYS

Wild horses are getting so numerous in Southeastern Oregon they encroach on the range grass of the cattle herds, reports of state range wardens reveal. Last week 80 cow-

boys went out intent on rounding-up 500 of the wild moochers. But now there are more wild horses than before. Not only did the wild band give the raiders the slip but sold the idea of democracy and freedom to 25 of the cow-ponies one night. The cowboys have abandoned the round-up plans and will settle for their own 25 saddle horses.

Sitton Talks Of Beet Fertilizer

Have you ever thought of the soil on your farm as a factory? Do you realize that your soil will not maintain its rate of productivity unless you add something to replace the raw materials that your crops take from the soil?

The soils of Malheur county and the adjoining area are in their original state low in organic matter, because the native vegetation was not of a character to return organic matter to the soil. These soils for the most part contain relatively large amounts of minerals, calcium, phosphorus and potash. These are the major plant elements which the plants require the most of. Nitrogen is lacking but can best be applied by growing legumes in your rotation. The minor soil elements such as iron, magnesium, sulphur and others are required in smaller amounts and do not become depleted as fast as the major elements.

These soils are for the most part high in calcium, this element is one which will probably never become depleted because of the location, climatic and other conditions which influence the character of these soils. An over supply of calcium compounds causes soil to be alkaline. Calcium also ties up other essential minerals so that plants cannot use them. Would you add a lot more oil to your tractor when you knew it had plenty? If you did it would become sluggish and put out less power. So it is with calcium, it is very foolish and a waste of time to add soil amendments which contain calcium compounds, such as lime and gypsum. You are merely making a bad condition worse because we already have too much calcium in the soil.

Fertilizer trials on this station indicate that on the older soils in this county, very marked benefits may be obtained by use of certain fertilizers. Sugar beet fertility trials showed an average increase of 4% tons of beets when 5 tons of barnyard manure were applied. When 125 lbs. of super treble phosphate was added to the manure a further increase of 1 1/2 to 2 tons of beets were obtained. 1 ton of manure contains 10 lbs. of Nitrogen, 5 lbs. of Phosphoric acid and 10 lbs. of Potash. Some increase in production on older soils, especially with sugar beets may be realized when potash is added. 100 lbs. of muriate of potash broadcast in addition to 50 lbs. of Nitrogen and 125 lbs. of super-

treble phosphate gave an increase of 2.5 tons of beets over nitrogen and phosphate alone. When pure commercial nitrogen was added (50 lbs. of Urea) a decrease in yield was obtained (.9 of a ton) when it was added to phosphate and potash, also when added to phosphate, potash and sulphur. It would seem that a legume crop in the rotation would supply the necessary nitrogen for beets.

Sulphur gave an increase of 1/2 ton when added to manure over manure alone. Sulphur (100 lbs. broadcast) alone gave a 3 1/2 ton increase over the check plot. In every combination in which sulphur appeared it showed a decided increase in yield from 1/2 to 3 1/2 tons. In four different combinations sulphur gave a 3-ton or better increase. Why does sulphur give such an increase? There are several ways that sulphur may react in these soils. The mere fact that sulphur alone gave such an increase in yield shows that these older soils are deficient in sulphur. When sulphur is added to the soil it reacts in the following manner. It oxidizes into sulphur dioxide then into a weak solution of sulphuric acid and by the aid of the sulphurizing bacteria to the sulphate form which the plant can use. In the acid form sulphur reacts with the insoluble compounds of phosphorus, potassium magnesium, etc., and makes them available for plant use. Alkaline soils are high in toxic sodium carbonate and sodium bicarbonate and sulphur reacts to change these toxic carbonates of soda to the sulphate form which is nontoxic. This is done in addition to supplying the plant food sulphur. The leguminous family removes large quantities of sulphur as it plays an important part in protein formation. 1 ton of alfalfa hay removes 5.74 lbs. of sulphur. Sulphur very definitely reacts with the large amounts of calcium in the soil making it available for plant use. By freeing the calcium it also frees other elements such as phosphorus which the calcium had tied up.

Since 100 lbs. of gypsum contain 18 lbs. of sulphur and 23 lbs. of calcium and since these soils already have an over supply of calcium, it is much cheaper and better when adding sulphur to use 99 1/2 per cent soil sulphur. Sulphur should be broadcast early in the spring and then disked or harrowed into the soil. Never plow soil sulphur under when using it for fertilizer. The application of sulphur once in a rotation will probably be sufficient (100 lbs.)

Sugar beets draw heavily upon the phosphate in the soil, therefore in order to maintain the right amount of phosphate it is necessary to apply it in a commercial form. Barnyard manure is low in phosphate in relation to nitrogen and potash. Adding sulphur and phosphate with manure is a good practice. Legumes both for forage crops which add nitrogen and for green manure crops to add organic material are essential. Use commercial fertilizers as a supplement to a good crop rotation.

Rates, methods and times of application of fertilizers both commercial and non-commercial are being studied on this station and in the near future more information will be available on this subject.

Remember there will be other generations after yours on the soil you are now farming and it is your obligation to leave the soil in a good if not better condition than when you took it.

Notice of Special Election

Notice is hereby given, in compliance with a resolution passed by the Board of Directors of School District No. 26C, Malheur County, Oregon, and dated April 13, 1944, and Chapter 140, Oregon Laws of 1939, that a Special Election will be held on June 19, 1944, at the elementary school of said district between the hours of 2:00 and 7:00 P.M. to vote upon the following proposition:

Shall School District No. 26C in Malheur County, Oregon, levy taxes in accordance with Chapter 140, Oregon Laws 1939, during each of the following fiscal years beginning July 1, 1944, 1945, 1946, 1947 and 1948, in the amount of five (5) mills annually for the purpose of providing in advance a sinking fund for financing post-war construction, reconstruction, improvement, betterment, repair or rehabilitation of schools, school plants, and school premises to provide more adequately for the public school population of said district on the secondary and elementary level, the total estimated cost of which will be \$75,000 and also authorize the use of state or federal matching funds should they become available, which levy shall be outside the limitation imposed by Article XI, Section 11, of the Oregon Constitution?
