Tells How Army Treats Burns



JACKSONVILLE, FLA. . . . Major Boardman Bosworth, U. S. Army Medical Corps, who led mobile surgery units into fierce North African battles, is shown as he told the Conference of American College of Surgeons how "the method of treating burns seems to be swinging back to a modified version of grandma's remedy." Major Bosworth declared that the U. S. Army has adopted as standard treatment the use of petrolatum, also known as petroleum jelly, for healing burns. He explained that petrolatum lessened pain by sealing burns from air and when used with pressure dressings it helped reduce loss of blood plasma and to permit the body's natural healing agents to work freely.

Hunting Laws Changes Asked

Recommendations for the lengthening of the pheasant and partidge hunting seasons in Malheur county, with smaller daily bag limits, were made to the state game commission as a result of the meeting of the Malheur Fish and Game league last week.

The state game commission, which met June 10 to promulgate the regulations for the coming seasons, was asked by the local league to extend Malheur county pheasant season from October 15 to December 15, with a bag limit of four birds per day and 8 in possession. The men also asked that the Hungarian partidge season be extended from the earliest date to the latest date that either the pheasant or duck season will be open in the county. No recommendations for the changes of big game regulations were made but the league did ask the state to use its influence on the federal department to make the duck shooting season longer with larger bag limits and no regulations on cold storage of ducks after the season closes.
