An average of 50 applications for ballots is being received daily from soldiers in service outside Oregon, Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell, Jr., reports. Careful planning by state and county officers gives Oregon's 115,000 odd voting men and women in war service one of the best opportunities to cast their ballot of any soldiers in the nation.

All county clerks of the state will meet here at the capitol, July 10, to discuss the use of a uniform system of absentee voting and to clarify any misunderstanding of the method. The federal government is providing postcards which serve both as an application for an absentee ballot and as registration for those who are not registered. These federal cards will be given out so they will reach soldiers overseas not later than August 15, and soldiers in this country by September 15. Air mail for ballots has been provided and army officers reckon no Oregon soldier, even if in the most remote part of the world, is more than 17 days by air mail from his voting precinct. An officer in each camp has been designated as voting official, his duty to inform each soldier of the workings of the absentee voting system.

NEW ADJUTANT GENERAL

Governor Earl Snell has appointed Colonel Ray F. Olson, Salem, as acting adjutant general for Oregon, succeeding Colonel Elmer V. Wootton who resigned that he might devote all his time to the duties of selective service director of Oregon. Colonel Olson will serve during the absence of Brigadier-General Thomas E. Rilea, adjutant general, who is now in military service. General Rilea succeeded the late Major General George A. White.

GOVERNOR RECEIVES GAVEL

Governor Earl Snell this week received a gavel, made of wood from Independence Hall in Philadelphia, as a gift from the state of Pennsylvania. The gavel was in a box made of wood from the U.S.S. Niagra, which fought in the battle of Lake Erie in the war of 1812.

BALLOT MEASURES

There will be five constitutional amendments and two measures on the November ballot which the legislature referred to the people. They would: (1) Provide homes and farms for soldiers of the current war; (2) Establish a county-manager form of government; (3) Repeal the double liability of state bank stockholders; (4) Provide a 3 per cent sales tax; (5) Authorize financial aid for an education of veterans of present war; (6) Would Defeat the Burke bill which takes the sale of 14 per cent wines from wine shops and transfers control to the state liquor commission; (7) Authorize the legislature to restore citizenship to convicts.

HIGH PRAISE IS GIVEN TO WAVES

High praise of the work of the WAVES given by Admiral Ernest J. King, commander-in-chief of the U.S. fleet and chief of naval operations in a recent report to the secretary of the navy, has been reiterated by officers-in-charge of the naval stations and activities in Oregon where WAVES are now on duty, according to a report just released by Rives Waller, of the Baker U.S. navy recruiting station, which handles WAVE applications in this area.

Increasing efficiency in handling the Navy's mass of business in major phases of its operations in Oregon, bearing out Admiral King's report on the success of the WAVE program in his review of the progress and expansion of the navy since the beginning of the war.

"As a result of their competence, their hard work and their enthusiasm, the release of men for sea

duty has been accomplished in many cases, particularly in offices by increases in efficiency," wrote Admiral King in his report. "The material consequence is in a 'esprit de corps' which embraces their value to the Navy, and it is a pleasure to report that in addition to their having earned an excellent reputation as part of the Navy, they have become an inspiration to all men in Naval uniforms."
