## REVISING OLD AGE GRANTS

In the past two years old age pensions in Oregon have nearly doubled. More than one-third of those receiving old age assistance grants in this state are now receiving the full amount of \$40 a month according to a statement by Governor Earl Snell. In June 1942, the average was \$23.01. For June, this year, the average state grant is \$33.32. Medical assistance in supplemental and averages on the state level \$1.76, making the overall grant \$35.08. Being supplemental, the average aid applies also to those who are receiving the \$40 maximum. Medical aid comes from "general assistance". State and county public welfare commissions endeavor to provide individuals in similar circumstances similar treatment throughout the state.

The direct property tax load has been relieved by the elimination of the \$2,500,000 general appropriation and the state assuming 90 per cent of the general assistance load thereby providing tax relief to the counties. The prior ratio was on a 60-40 basis. The state and county welfare commissions are reviewing state pensions to conform all to present standards of assistance.

## CASH FOR COUNTIES

A total of \$294,148.05 has been appropriated to the 36 counties of the state from the irreducible school fund, the state land board announced this week. The apportionment was made on a scale of \$1.05 for each of Oregon's 280,141 school children between the ages of 4 and 20 years of age. The distribution was made for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1944.

**STICKERS FOR '45**  
The war-time emergency stickers will be used again in 1945 as automobile licenses. After experiments with various substitutes, including plastics, for the metal plates of pre-war days, Secretary of State Robert S. Parrell, Jr. decided to use stickers similar to those used last year. Steel priorities and lack of manpower prevent the return to the use of metal plates. The 1942 white and blue plates will continue in use, with the sticker to be used on the windshield.

**STATE BUYS WAR BONDS**  
There is now enough "buried"

cash for post-war projects, as planned by state, county, city and school district commissions, to employ 36,000 men at \$1800 a year for one year. In a report presented to governor Earl Snell this week the state post-war commission said that 36,000 men in one-third of the estimated unemployment immediately after the war. Besides the amount of money available, now totaling \$73,000,000, many more millions are expected from federal government and other agencies.

## RULINGS ON OREGON LAWS

Attorney General George Neuner has just ruled that state funds allocated to Oregon fairs and expositions may be saved each year and spent by the fairs after the war. The institutions participating in the distribution of these funds derived from dog and horse racing wagers, are the Pacific international livestock exposition, Oregon state fair, eastern Oregon livestock show, Pendleton round-up and the northwestern turkey show. Some of the funds may be spent at any time, however, for general maintenance, Neuner ruled.

## RELIGIOUS FREEDOM

A supreme court decision handed down last week upholds a law prohibiting boys under 10 years of age and girls under 18 from selling newspapers or magazines and ruled that the law applies to those selling religious tracts. The decision upheld a \$25 fine imposed against Mrs. Rowena Thornton, a member of Jehovah's Witnesses who allowed her 10-year-old daughter to vend the sect's publications.

Mrs. Thornton charged that the law, which is a Portland ordinance similar to those in other cities, deprived her of religious freedom, but the court ruled it was a "reasonable limitation" of that freedom.

## CAPITAL SHORTS

Several state officials attended funeral services in Portland on Wednesday of the late Dermore Nickerson, executive secretary of the state AFL. Detaining at Salem Saturday James Mott was the first Oregon member to arrive home upon the adjournment of congress. State income tax rates will be announced July 10th.
