PENSIONS FOR JUDGES

There is considerable debate here at the capitol as to whether the state tax commission should collect a pinball machine tax from the so-called judge's pension act. It seems to be as much of a gamble as the



When the 1943 legislature passed the act they thought they were safeguarding the state against the "seven old men" freeze. Since there is about as much voting competition for justices of the supreme court as there is for school directors the judges became fixtures, nodding into senility and uselessness. The legislature thought something should be done about it--and so the law provided money to set up the machinery of the act, a \$10,000 nestegg, an annual donation of 2 per cent of the salary of the judges who choose to come under the act and a withholding of three per cent of the salary of the participants. When a participant under the act served as a state justice of the supreme court or a judge of the circuit court for 17 years continuously and has reached the age of 70 years he can resign and draw a pension of \$200 month. JAPS RETURN

The state board of control reluctantly agreed to transfer three Japanese insane patients, who had been moved out of Oregon by the war relocation authority, from an Idaho state hospital to the eastern Oregon state hospital at Pendleton. The federal government will pay the state of Oregon \$1.20 a day for the care of each of the Japanese for the duration of the war.

Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell, Jr. said the best way to solve the problem would be to "take those Japs out and shoot 'em" while State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott said "I don't suppose our marines on Saipan would think very favorably of our actions." Governor Earl Snell said the board of control had to approve the transfer as a matter of reciprocity between the states.

PRICE SPECIALIST QUILTS

Resignation of J. E. Chambers, senior price specialist of the district office of OPA, with headquarters in Portland has been accepted and R. A. Westering appointed to the vacated position. Chambers, a former Penny store manager, has held the price specialist office since 1942.

MANSON FOR CHIEF EXECUTIVE

The erection of a gubernatorial mansion at the capitol is under consideration by members of the le-

gisature and those up for election. Many of the states furnish a residence for their chief executive but the people of Oregon have never given such a proposal favorable consideration. Eight times in the past sixty years the legislature has turned down provisions for a governor's home. From available history Governor Z. F. Moody has been the only governor who built a residence in Salem after being elected and occupied it while serving as governor. The recent demolition of one of the stately mansions of early Salem, built by Governor L. F. Grover in 1837, started the discussion.
