gene were second in unemployment claims last week. About 75 per cent of claimants in the shipbuilding industry were from other states.

Since the passage by congress of the GI bill of rights the state is confronted with complications in the payment of benefits to returned soldiers of this war. Supplementary benefits provided by the federal bill will start September 4th of this year. Some veterans have assets held by the state from pre-war earnings under the Oregon law which has been operative since 1938.

CATCH COMING HOME
Rear Admiral Thomas L. Gatch will come home to Salem August 14 to receive an honorary degree from the university of which his grandfather was president. Acceptance of Willamette university's invitation was received by the institution's president, G. Herbert Smith, this week.

The rear admiral was born and raised in Salem. Following the brilliant performance in the south Pacific of the U.S.S. South Dakota, which he commanded, he was named judge advocate general. He will be given the honorary doctorate in law which he was to have received at the June commencement exercises, but was unavoidably detained.

GOVERNOR FILLS VACANCIES
Governor Earl Snell has announced the appointment of James T. Marr, executive secretary of the state Federation of Labor, to a membership on the postwar adjustment and development commission, succeeding the late D. E. Nickerson. George W. Gleason, Corvallis, was also named to the commission.

NO FUEL SHORTAGE
Fuel problems that loomed so menacingly in Oregon a year ago have been eliminated according to former state fuel coordinator Lynn F. Cronmiller. He was so efficient that he worked himself out of a job or the necessity of the existence of the office. Portland, that was the acute spot of fuel shortage, now has a surplus of sawdust, slabwood and timber-cut wood as has the rest of the state. Hardwood is the only bottleneck and that is not serious. Slabwood sells for \$7 to \$9 a cord in Portland and less in most other parts of the state. Hardwood sells for from \$12 to \$15 a cord with the market easing.

ACCURACY OF FORESIGHT
There has been no meeting of the state emergency board since October 23, 1942 and the unusual will occur if the biennium of 1943-44 should pass without the board being called upon to meet a financial emergency of some department. Since 21 months have gone by without a meeting of the board the foresight of the budget makers of the 1943 legislature is reaching an all-time high in long distance calculating.

VETERANS BENEFITS
As jobs are plentiful, only a few of the thousands of returned veterans of world war 11 have filed claims under the Oregon law for unemployment benefits. In June last the claims filed showed a slight increase over May of this year but are lower than they were in May or June last year. About 200 claimants are now drawing the \$20 a week for 52 weeks allowed to most service-men. The past year total of benefits paid was \$103,717.
