Brooke should have the active support of the community, and as a part of the farm safety program the moving of hay derricks should be given a special consideration. Mr. Beck said.

Mr. Beck gave the following suggestions to farmers who find it necessary to move their derricks under or near power lines: When moving a hay derrick tie the boom securely with rope and make sure that it is level. Pull the derrick with a tractor if it is available in preference to horses. Anyone who is not needed in the actual moving of the derrick should stay in the clear. If there is any doubt about the clearance of the derrick in passing under electric wires call the power company asking them for help free of charge, because of a manpower shortage please give the power company as much advance notice of the proposed move as possible and if an accident happens get away from the equipment and leave it alone, calling the power company at once.
