## WAR EFFORT TANGENT

A bottleneck in the war effort brought Senator Guy Cordon to Oregon by plane from Washington, D. C. last Friday. Freight trucks carrying airplane parts have been stalled because they could not obtain the necessary tires. Freight lines are abandoning trucks rather than risk accidents caused by worn tires.

Senator Cordon is hopeful of having enough rubber tires diverted from government stockpiles, without time consuming red tape, to keep the vitally necessary war industries supplied with tires. The pinch in heavy tires is the result of OPA's 67 per cent reduction in truck tire allotments.

Trips over the state by Senator Cordon have been scheduled so he may return to Washington on call to attend special committee assignments on emergency matters demanding immediate attention and that reports can be prepared and ready for the congress when the present recess-vacation has terminated.

## CRACKDOWN DUE

While selective service is not loosing sight to the further possible need of war, efforts will be directed to see that every delinquent either is in the army or jail. Col. Edward Shattuck general council for the selective service system with headquarters in Washington, D. C., said when visiting the Oregon office.

Selective service is placing increasing emphasis on the future welfare of the men it placed in the armed forces by following that section of the laws which provides, in effect, that machinery may be set up to assure "that our boys in the service get what they are entitled to when they return."

## MAKING G.O.P. MEDICINE

President of the Senate W. H. Steiwer of Possil became acting governor Saturday evening when Governor Snell left the state. Governor and Mrs. Snell are in St. Louis where the governor will attend the conference August 2 and 3 of the 26 republican governors who will plan their strategy for the presidential campaign. The governor plans to return to his office August 10th.

## EMERGENCY APPROPRIATIONS

The state emergency board met at the capitol last Friday for the first time in the present biennium. An appropriation of \$20,000 was made to the state fish commission, \$15,000 for a steam pipe line between the Fairview home and the Hillcrest home for girls, \$7,500 to increase \$10 a month the salaries of employees at the capitol \$4000 to increase salaries of the department of public instruction, \$700 for the text book commission, \$185 for the apprenticeship council and \$500 for the emergency board's own expenses.

## BUDGETING UNDER WAY

Budget forms have been sent all state departments by George K. Aiken, state budget director, with a request that they be filed by August 15th. The estimates must be made six months before the legislature meets, six months before the present biannual budget runs out, and one year before the next budget is to take effect.

## BANK ASSETS \$97 MILLION

Deposits in Oregon's 47 state banks have increased in the past year from \$83,947,000 to \$91,155,000. A total of \$97,298,000 is listed as assets of the 47 banks at the end of the fiscal year, June 30. The figures re-

present and increase from \$88,479,000 on December 31, 1943. ARMS FOR GUARD

The war department will provide arms and equipment for 2,000 of the 7,000 members of the Oregon state guard, instead of only 4,221 members as has been the case. Colonel Colonel R. F. Olson, acting adjutant general was advised by the war department this week. The state of Oregon supports the other 5,000 guardsmen.

## ALUMENA ORE FOUND

Stable deposits of high-alumina iron ore or high-iron bauxite, which could be dug by surface mining, have been found in northern Washington county, the state department of geology and mineral industries have advised Governor Earl Snell.
