WEISER TO STAGE THREE-DAY RODEO

Special invitation was extended to the people of the Nyssa area to attend the Weiser Valley Rodeo August 18, 19 and 20 at the Weiser rodeo grounds. Performances will be held at 8 o'clock Friday and Saturday evenings and at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

Proceeds from the rodeo will be used to purchase war bonds which will be turned over to the Weiser Valley Hospital association.

The rodeo promises to be the biggest and best rodeo staged in the lower Snake River valley in the past ten years. It is open to both amateurs and professional riders alike and a string of rodeo stock composed of 22 bucking horses, 12 Brahma bulls and 10 longhorn bulldozing steers has been engaged. Horse racing will be one of the main features and several riders of this area have voiced their intention of entering the events.

A livestock show by 4-H club members will be held at the armory building near the rodeo grounds. Parades, concessions, clowns and special acts will be featured in connection with the show.

The rodeo committee decided to stage a parade through the business district before each performance. Prizes will be awarded for best entries in the different groups of the parade.

The advance ticket sale for the reserve seat section under the direction of A. S. Jones will be started August 12.

SOME GAME TAG SALES CONCLUDED

No more applications will be accepted by the Oregon state game commission for big game tags for Grant-Baker doe deer; antlerless elk; or Hart Mountain buck and doe deer. As the number of applications exceeded the quota of these tags, drawings were held on August 2 to determine the successful applicants. Everyone will be notified of the results of the drawings as fast as the notices can be mailed out by the Commission, and those who are to receive tags will be given ten days from the date of the notice in which to forward the required fees.

There are plenty of antelope tags available and these are now being issued in the order applications are received. To apply for an antelope tag it is necessary to forward the fee of \$2.50 for a resident or \$5 for a nonresident, together with information as to the number and kind of hunting license held by the applicant.

ROADSIDE FIRE HAZARD IS CITED

"Travelers on eastern Oregon highways have been sabotaging the war effort", said Edmund Hayes, Portland, chairman, Keep Oregon Green executive committee, in commenting today on the large number of roadside fires in grass and wheat lands which have been started by a carelessly thrown cigarette or match from passing cars.

"I doubt if any of the several fi-

res which have burned into valuable grain and grasslands were started intentionally," the KOG leader pointed out. "In the majority of cases these fires were started when some smoker flipped his lighted match or cigarette out the car window instead of using the ashtray. It is the duty of every person to help stop these fires which are destroying our much needed food supply."

"With eastern Oregon drier than usual because of a shortage of rainfall, the danger this summer is greater than ever," the Keep Oregon Green leader stated. "Manpower is equally short and much needed in the harvest. Men can not be spared for fire fighting. One carelessly started roadside fire last month destroyed 20,000 acres of ripe grain and 10,000 acres of grasslands. This is pure criminal carelessness."

"After the war, food will be critical because this nation will no doubt be called upon to help feed liberated Europe," the fire prevention spokesman said. "Let every man and woman in this county do his share to Keep Oregon Green."
