



commission say the state property tax again will be eliminated for the next year, while the elementary school tax included in the levy, will be paid out of the bulging surplus of state income tax revenues.

Last year's income tax payments were more than \$21,000,000. This year's collections it is estimated will return \$10,000,000. The 1943 discount was more possible by funds accumulated over several years. The dis-

count this year estimated to be 30 per cent, is made possible by the marked increase in revenues due to improved business conditions.

EMERGENCY CARE EXTENDED

The federal program which gives emergency maternity care without cost to the wives and infants of men in the four lowest pay grades in the army, navy, coast guard and marine corps has been extended to wives and infants of army aviation cadets. The extension is made under the new appropriation of \$42,800,000 made by congress for the next 12 months.
