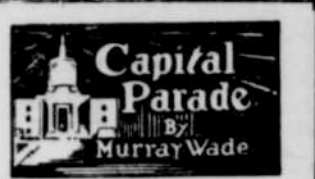

VISION V-DAY

Looking forward to the day when victory is won in the European war theatre, Governor Earl Snell has announced that while it will be a day for thanksgiving and appropriate rejoicing, it also will be a day for dedication by Oregon citizens to the tasks and sacrifices yet ahead before total victory is won and peace established throughout the world.

"On that day toward which our valiant allied armies are still striving in Europe, we shall pause to honor the heroes who have achieved victory in that area and to pay tribute to the great fighting forces of the Allied Nations, but we must not and we will not relax our all-out war effort in the midst of our rejoicing," stated the governor.

Here on the west coast we should be doubly aware of the job yet unfinished and the menace in the Pacific until Japan is conquered," Governor Snell added. "The day of European victory, indeed, should be a day of great joy and thanksgiving but it also should serve to renew our determination to carry on with no slacking of energy or spirit the final struggle to bring complete victory over a ruthless and vicious enemy."

Governor Snell indicated that when word of victory is received he would issue a proclamation designating V-Day in Europe as an occasion for thanksgiving and a day when fitting and appropriate tribute should be paid to our gallant forces and those heroic allied armies whose achievements and sacrifices have brought success to a just and worthy cause. The proclamation will also call for a reconcentration of efforts toward the tremendous task still ahead.

SEASONABLE INDUSTRIES

The number of seasonal employees registered under the state unemployment compensation law has dropped to 150, as compared with 825 in 1941. Most seasonal employees are cannery, with seed cleaners and warehousing not far behind.

The drop in the number of seasonal industries is due to the fact that many of them now operate throughout the year. Marion county leads with 23 seasonal industries, followed by Clatsop's 21 and Multnomah's 16.

TURKEY CAPITAL

"Oregon is about to become the turkey capital of the United States," State Director of Agriculture E. L. Peterson told delegates at the Oregon Turkey Improvement association at their annual meeting here last week.

Sixty million pounds of turkey will be required for the armed forces this year and about one-fifth of that amount will be furnished by Oregon turkey growers according to an army estimate furnished the state department.

Of the state's \$30,000,000 income from poultry in 1943 half of the amount was from the turkey industry.

The board opposed the "little Townsend" 3 to 5 gross income tax (sales tax) and the Burke bill which would take the sale of wines of more than 14 per cent from the wine shops and place them under state control, with the liquor commission.

CAPITAL SHORTS

Investigation has disclosed that many departments of the state here at the capital have an average of 50 per cent of their employees regularly giving blood for the mobile blood bank. Seventeen persons were killed in Oregon traffic accidents in August, only three of the 17 fatalities were in urban areas, or one each in Portland, Salem and Grants Pass. The state department has been informed by AAA that more used army trucks will be released soon to Oregon farmers. There were four fatalities among the 1941 industrial accidents reported in Oregon the past week. Commendation of state employees for their assistance in working during the peak season in the processing and canning industry comes from the manpower commission through the executive department.

GIVE YOUR LUNCH BOX "S. A." "S. A."—"Sandwich Appeal" should be the first requirement of every school lunch.

Your boy and girl think longingly of the lunch hour and the "good sandwiches" mom fixed. Don't let them down. Plan their lunch menus with nutrients and eye appeal in mind.

Would you like a couple of suggestions for sandwich fillings?

MOCK CHICKEN FILLING

1 c. coarsely ground cooked pork or veal

1/2 c. chopped or shredded raw carrots

1/2 c. chopped celery

2 T. Chow Chow

3 T. Mayonnaise

Salt to taste

Combine all ingredients and mix thoroughly. Spread between slices of enriched or whole wheat bread which have been buttered.

CARROT-PEANUT-RAISIN SANDWICH FILLING

1 c. raw ground carrots

1 c. salted peanuts

1 c. seedless raisins

1/2 t. salt

2 t. lemon juice

2 T. mayonnaise

Peel carrots and grind coarsely with the raisins and peanuts. Add salt, lemon juice and mayonnaise. Mix well. Store in refrigerator until used.

"The old idea of bare fallow for three or four years to kill a patch of noxious weeds has been overthrown, and this year fall barley on morning glory land yielded as high as 65 bushel per acre," Holladay said.

The following program for the clean cultivation on noxious weeds in Malheur county is recommended: One year clean cultivation, fall seeding of smother crop; fall barley, wheat, or oats seeded by the middle of September, pasture crop or cut for hay before weeds go into bud stage, remove crop and clean cultivate every 8 to 10 days after weeds emerge, flood irrigate at least once between cultivations during middle of summer to stimulate root growth, germinate seedlings, and relieve the mulchy condition of ground, repeat practice for at least three years, and follow with row crop for at least two years to catch any seedlings remaining.

The use of chemical on smaller weed patches is also a common practice, Holladay said. This year AAA payments will nearly cover all costs of chemical application and farmers have increased their usage of carbon bisulphide and sodium chlorate. Chemicals are available in the county and farmers should make every effort to get noxious weed areas under control before winter sets in, he stated.
