ger form of government before the people for a vote.  
Our present city councilmen, and probably those who have served in the past, do not like to serve on the council because they do not have the time to give it proper consideration and receive no support or encouragement from the voters. When a few voters appear at the polls and vote they dump the management of the city onto the shoulders of the councilmen and mayor and never give the city government another thought until two years later when they again cast their ballots. Of course, a big percentage never even cast their ballots, but leave the problems of the city entirely to the officials.

We should have a paid executive at the head of our city government, principally because the people do not want to be bothered about city affairs, despite the fact that the council controls and spends thousands of dollars annually and will spend more when the proposed post-war projects are undertaken.

So far as the publishers of this paper know, the present council is conducting city affairs as efficiently as any council could, but certainly a paid executive could give more attention to details and thus gain greater returns for every dollar spent.
