"CHRISTMAS COOKIES"

"Christmas Cookie Baking Time" is one of the "musts before Christmas" in the majority of homes. Youngsters and oldsters look forward to the occasion.

Since special cutters are scarce, it takes ingenuity to achieve an assortment.

(1) Use cardboard cutouts of stars, stockings, trees, bells, angels, and little men—then cut around the shapes with a small, sharp knife.

(2) To color sugar, add 1 or 2 drops of food coloring to 1/4 cup of sugar and mix with a spoon until uniform. Sprinkle colored sugar on

Granges Help In Bond Drive



SIXTH WAR LOAN PRIZES—Granges of Oregon have accepted the responsibility for raising the State's entire rural quota of nearly \$13,000,000 in War Bonds during the Sixth War Loan drive. They are now competing for these prizes which will be awarded Granges having the highest per capita average of War Bond purchases and sales between now and December 31. To the winning Grange, east of the Cascades, will go a registered Aberdeen-Angus bull, upper left, donated to the cause by the Pacific Coast Aberdeen-Angus association. For Granges west of the Cascades, a registered Jersey bull of the type shown at the right is being offered by the Oregon Jersey Cattle club. The registered Duroc—Jersey sow, lower left, from E. C. Sammons, State chairman of the Oregon War Finance committee, will be given as second prize east of the mountains. Pacific Wool Growers association is giving a registered Romney ram, lower right, as second prize for western Oregon Granges. On a basis of the current Oregon Grange membership of approximately 25,000 the quota assigned in this Sixth War Loan drive will amount to \$500.00 per member which they must either buy or sell. This is the first time in Oregon's history that a quota for the state's farm people has been set.

cookies. On tree-shaped cookies, arrange colored candies to resemble Christmas Bells.

"HOLIDAY COOKIES"

1/2 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
1 well-beaten egg
2 tablespoons milk
2 cups sifted cake flour
1 1/4 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 egg white, beaten
2 tablespoons sugar
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
Split almonds

Cream shortening; add sugar gradually and cream until fluffy. Add egg, milk and flour; blend. Chill overnight. Roll 1/4" thick on slightly floured board. Cut with floured doughnut cutter. Place on ungreased baking sheet. Brush with slightly beaten egg white, sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon and arrange almonds on each cookie. Bake in 375 degree oven for 10 minutes. (Makes 5 dozen cookies).

INCOME TAX DILEMMA

Up to this time, 1251 married couples have elected to come under the community property laws of Oregon that they might file joint income tax returns thereby reducing their income tax payments. Husbands and wives who have come under the provisions of the law by declaring their spouses to be joint owners of their incomes, and of all properties acquired from incomes

since coming under the law, now find that they may not be able to enjoy the benefits for which the law was designed.

Governor Earl Snell has asked the attorney general for an opinion as to what legislative steps may be required to permit Oregon married couples now under the community property law to return to their former status should they so desire. Under the present law such contracts and agreements are irrevocable.

Action was taken by Governor Snell in view of the recent United States supreme court decision that Oklahoma's community property law was not applicable to the federal income tax structure. Oregon's law, enacted by the 1943 legislature, was modeled upon the Oklahoma statute. One of the principal intentions was to permit assigned incomes between man and wife in filing separate tax returns. When the community property bill was before the legislature it was argued that many states were adopting similar laws and Oregon would lose many wealthy families to these states if the law was not adopted.

DR. STRICKER TO QUIT

Dr. Frederick D. Stricker, secretary of the state board of health and state health officer for 24 years, will resign soon after January 1, according to reports reaching the capital from friends of the 70-year-old official. When asked about the report, Dr. Stricker replied that work he is now doing would not permit him to leave before January 1.

WANT MERIT SYSTEM

Delegates to the Oregon State Employees council, meeting at the capital Saturday and Sunday, went on record in favor of immediate enactment of legislation providing for a merit system and retirement pay for all state employees.

DUNNE REAPPOINTED

T. Morris Dunne, who has served 12 years on the state industrial accident and state unemployment compensation commissions, has been reappointed by Governor Snell to a four year term beginning January 1. The Governor has just made two appointments to the state apprenticeship council for terms ending June 8, 1947. Ralph Waggoner, Klamath Falls, who represents employees, was reappointed while William Krueger, Oregon City, was appointed to represent employers, succeeding Carl Gerlinger, Jr., Dallas.

LAND BOARD TRAVELS

The state land board, including Governor Earl Snell, Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell, Jr., State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott and Lewis Griffith, clerk of the board, left the capital Sunday afternoon for the Warner Valley district in Lake county. They will spend two days inspecting the state lands around Flagstaff lake and the lake. The state is contemplating leasing the lands for an extended period of years to private parties for a reclamation project.

GREEK RELIEF

Pathetic conditions brought on by

Nazi occupation are now exposed since the liberation of Greece. A report to Charles A. Sprague, president of the Oregon war chest, puts emphasis on the effect of the years of malnutrition, tuberculosis, dysentery, trachoma and other diseases that have increased to epidemic proportions.
