Two Oregon Entries Win Market Gardenin Awards

Two Oregon entrants planned, planted, hoed and harvested their way to a sectional and a regional award in the 1944 National Junior Vegetable Growers' Association production and marketing contest. Winners were announced in the association's tenth annual convention at Rochester, N. Y., by Prof. Grant B. Snyder of Massachusetts State College, advisory chairman for the junior growers. Reed Vollstedt, 18, R.F.D. 4, Albany, was named Western Region champion and Richard Krenz, 18, R.F.D. 3, Silverton, won a sectional award. Reed receives \$200 and Richard receives \$100 provided in the national contest by the Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company. Other Oregon awards consist of \$25 war bonds won by William G. Lane, Boring, and Betty Ames, Lebanon. Reed, son of Otto A. Vollstedt, lives on a 198-acre farm in Benton county. He cropped a three-acre garden, featuring cabbage, and produced a harvest with a market value of \$903. He was in the top half of his 1944 high school graduating class, has been in 4-H Club work seven years. In three years in F.F.A. he has been chapter president and president of the Oregon Association of Future Farmers of America. He is a Junior Rotarian, active in the Grange and has served as leader of six 4-H Clubs. Richard, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Krenz, lives on a 107-acre farm in Marion county. He enlisted in the Army Air Corps Reserve Jan. 23, 1944, but was not called into training until Sept. 21. He completed high school in 1944, had been in 4-H Club work eight years and in F.F.A. four years. He received a State Farmer Degree from the Future Farmers of America. His market garden entered in the contest covered a half acre and produced 21 kinds of vegetables. Youths in 44 states competed for sectional and regional awards and for a national championship. Top honors nationally were awarded, Prof. Snyder announced, to Donald F. Sullivan, 19, of Potsdam, N. Y., who receives a \$500 scholarship.

Veterans Information

11. Q. What is meant by "agency" in this connection?
A. This means any federal instrumentality designated by the administrator (including veterans administration of so designated) to certify whether an application meets requirements of the Act and regulations, and recommend whether the application should be approved if the applicant is found eligible. (Sec. 400-4)
12. Q. After the application and papers are passed upon where are they sent?
A. The agency shall forward all the papers to the appropriate office of the administrator with recommendation as to approval or disapproval. (Sec. 402b) (NOTE: The administrator's representative in the field office will have delegated authority to act for him)
13. Q. If the application is approved, what happens?
A. The administrator will notify the agency and veteran of the approval, and will execute a loan guaranty certificate. This and all other papers—except the original application for guaranty which will be retained by the veterans' administration—will be forwarded to the proposed lender with instructions as to the closing of the loan in a manner to make the guaranty effective. (Sec. 402g)
14. Q. What if the application is disapproved?
A. The administrator will return to the proposed lender all papers except the original application for guaranty and will state the reasons for denial. Copies of this letter will be sent to the veteran and the agency.
15. Q. Is there any appeal?
A. Yes. The veteran and the proposed lender, or either, may appeal to the administrator within one month after receipt of notice of denial.
17. Q. Will all functions pertaining to the guaranty of loans be performed in the central office of the veterans administration?
A. No. These functions will also be performed in field offices from time to time designated for that purpose. Transactions and communications with, and contracts by such designated field offices, shall have the same effect as if with, or made by, central office. (Forward to Regulations).
18. Q. What means of identification shall a veteran use in entering upon negotiations for the guaranty of a loan?
A. As complete identification as possible. He should give his full first name, middle initial or middle name if unobjectionable, and surname. In addition to the full name other identifying data should be used, such as serial number in service, rank, organization at date of discharge, current residence, address, etc.
19. Q. A veteran may be eligible and qualified to obtain a loan from other government agencies set up to make loans for certain purposes. If he avails himself of this is his right or eligibility to the guaranty of a loan under this act affected one (Continued Next Week)
