Victory Food Hints

"CAKE WITH A TOPPING" How many housewives have been heard to make the comment, "I'd bake a cake if it wasn't for the frosting?" This might be due to the time element or it might be due to a sugar shortage in the family. For a sugar saver, bake cherry-filled coffee cake. It's delicious—it's nutritious.

Cherry-filled coffee cake Topping ¼ cup of sugar. ¼ cup of enriched flour. 1 teaspoon cinnamon. ¼ cup margarine or butter. 1½ cups drained, canned cherries. (1 no. 2 can) Mix sugar, flour, and cinnamon. Cut or rub in margarine or butter. Batter 1½ cups sifted enriched flour. ½ cup sugar. 2 teaspoons baking powder. 2-4 teaspoon salt. 1 egg. 2-4 cup milk. 1 tablespoons melted shortening.

Sift together flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Beat egg. Add milk and melted shortening. Add flour mixture, stirring only until flour is moistened. Into greased pan 8 by 8 inches, spread half the batter. Cover with cherries. Sprinkle half the topping over batter, and finally with remaining topping. Bake in moderately hot oven (400 degrees F) 25 minutes. Yield: 1 coffee cake, 8 by 8 inches.
