Kingman Kolony Case In Court

Testimony incident to an unusual case was presented in the court of Circuit Judge M. Allen Biggs Tuesday. The case is of interest to many Malheur county people who have been land owners in the Kingman Kolony district, north of Adrian, since its settlement.

The case involves the distribution of approximately \$9000 which has accumulated since the Kingman Irrigation company was dissolved in 1936, stated Judge Biggs.

Stock in the organization, which furnished the water for the Kingman project, taken over by the Bureau of Reclamation in 1936, was owned by the landowners of the district. The constitution of the organization stipulated that the landowners would share equally in the profits and losses of the project during its existence but failed to provide for distribution of funds after its dissolution.

The question to be decided by the court is whether the distribution is to be made among the former or the present owners of the fertile farms of the Kolony.

Attorney Aubrey Fletcher of Nyssa presented the case to the court, representing the trustees of the dissolved irrigation company. Attorney P. J. Gallagher of Ontario appeared in behalf of the interest of Mrs. Margaret Payne, widow of Dr. Payne, who was a landowner during the existence of the project. Attorney Robt. D. Lytle, Vale, pre-

sented testimony incident to the possibilities that the shares of stock would be transferred with land title and that accumulated funds would go to the present owners.

Judge Biggs gave Mr. Fletcher 30 days in which to file a brief and gave Mr. Lytle 20 days in which to file his answer. He then gave Mr. Fletcher 10 days in which to reply to Lytle's answer. The court will then take time to render a decision.
