"Dumplings for Dinner"
"Mamma's little dumplin", "Daddy's Sugar Plum", "Angel Pie". Did you ever stop to think how many endearing names are names of foods? Proof enough that food is near to a man's heart!
Dumplin', for instance, are universal favorites. But, they can be universal flops if you don't heed a few simple rules for cooking. They cook by steam and you must not peek while they are cooking and let the steam escape. Resist the impulse to lift the lid until the dumplings have had ample time to be cooked clear through—then—what a wonderful surprise you'll have—they'll be tiny mountains of loveliness.

Bran Dumplings

1 egg
½ cup bran
½ cup milk
1 cup sifted flour
3-4 t. salt.
2 t. baking powder.
Beat egg until light; add bran and milk. Sift together flour, salt and baking powder. Add liquid mixture to sifted dry ingredients and stir only until flour disappears. Drop batter by heaping teaspoonsful on top of hot meat or vegetable broth; cover tightly and let simmer for 20 min. without removing lid.

IT TAKES ONLY FIVE SECONDS to bag one hundred pounds of superphosphate fertilizer with the machine here being demonstrated to J. R. "Jack" Simplot, owner of the Pocatello acidulating plant in which the machine is located, by Clyde Higley, bagging foreman. The new Idaho fertilizer industry started by Simplot will keep bagging busy bagging 80,000 ton annual output of commercial fertilizer processed from Idaho phosphate rock. Idaho and intermountain farms can expect greater yield per acre when this superphosphate is applied to land as tests show most western soils deficient in phosphate. Simplot indicated that dealers have been appointed in most areas to distribute the product.
