Emily Post could smile with approval at the polite and orderly conclusion of the 43rd Oregon legislature on St. Patrick's day. Most of the day was taken up with motion following motion to reconsider previously defeated bills or to suspend the rules to bring out doomed bills held in committees. Verbal shillalals were swung and dodged as social errors approaching misdemeanors occurred. However, when the end neared all became serene to the tune (?) of Auld Lang Syne. The session lasted 69 days and established an all-time record for length of Oregon legislatures. The cost of the session is estimated to be \$235,000. The expense does not cease with the fall of the gavel, but continues for 40 days during which the journals of the two houses are revised and corrected. There were 931 bills, resolutions and memorials introduced, which is a near-record.

The late session was surely better than average. Its faults and virtues as human as those of the people who elected them to go to the capital.
Here are lobby and gallery interviews at random:
"Thirty years ago I thought we held a fine session. They are getting better.--Jay Bowerman, former governor and president of the senate in 1919.
"Although this legislature is regarded as being conservative, it has demonstrated that it recognizes the need for facing the problems of the future with realism. It has been fair in its approach to the problems in which laboring people have a particular interest."--S. Eugene Allen, editor Oregon Labor Press.
"Low," Harry Dean, 94-year-old doorkeeper of the house.
"Of the 900 bills introduced and 470 passed this legislature has a great deal to apologize for," Morton Tompkins, state grange master.

"Level headed bunch of men. One of the best legislatures we have had for a long time"--Oz West, former governor.
"Euhuh"--Chief Yallup, Columbia fisherman.
"This legislature, while fundamentally conservative, was liberal in many respects--pension, unemployment and salary increases, appropriations for improvements, veterans' legislation and planning for the return of men and women in the armed forces received major consideration. Any proposed increase in taxation consistently met opposition."--Governor Earl Snell.

Long Distance Politics
During the closing hours of the legislature speculation on a president of the senate and speaker of the house for the 1947 session brought out the names of Senators Lampert, Gibson, Chessman and Engdahl to be added to those of Senators Newberry, Cornette and Walsh who were candidates in 1943. All except Walsh and Cornette, who are holdovers, will have to run for re-election but are popular in their districts and practically assured of election. In the house Rep. Giles L. French and Ralph T. Moore, are readily accepted by a majority of the members of the present house as being eminently qualified to preside as speaker.

Gubernatorial Appointment
Senator William H. Strayer, of Baker, dean of the senate with thirty years of service in the state senate, has been re-appointed by Governor Earl Snell as a member of the state board of geology and mineral industries, for a term of four years. Senator Strayer has been a member of the board since its creation in 1937.

Americana
Many interesting individuals visited the legislature this session including brigadier generals, millionaires, Indian chiefs and noted authors. The visit of the so-called "one-man chamber of Commerce", A. Kalina, mayor of Malin, was of signal interest. Malin, in the Klamath potato growing district, has set a challenging example in civic achievement. His town with a population of 535 has established the first community park district in Oregon and is building a park which will cost \$135,000. Twenty-eight of the residents, most of whom are Czecho-Slovaks, donated \$500 each to the project.

Consideration Of Bills
Governor Snell said Wednesday he would finish action on bills well before the 20 days after adjournment he is given to sign, veto or file them without signature. Bills carrying the emergency clause become law on the expiration of the 20 day period if not vetoed--except those passed during the session when he has only 5 days in which to exercise his veto powers.

"Baked Macaroni Casserole"
1 Six ounce package 7-minute macaroni.
1 cup soft bread crumbs.
2 beaten eggs.
2 cups canned tomatoes.
1 cup diced American cheese.
1-3 cup diced green pepper.
1 t. minced onion.
1-4 cup butter.
Cook macaroni in boiling, salted water seven minutes, drain. Add remaining ingredients; mix lightly; season to taste. Pour into

greased two-quart casserole. Bake in moderate oven (325) degrees for 15 minutes.
