KINGMAN, ARIZ.--Recent graduate of the Kingman army air field flexible gunnery school, situated a few miles outside of Kingman, Arizona, was Miller Harlin Jensen, son of Mrs. Mary E. Jensen of Nyssa.

Sgt. Jensen entered the army at Boise, Idaho on March 11, 1942.

As a student gunner at the Kingman school Sgt. Jensen went through a ground school course in which he was taught the principles of ballistics, sighting, turret maintenance, range estimation and aircraft machine guns. Following a protracted course on the gunnery range, where he shot the .22 rifle, shotgun and calibre .30 and .50 machine guns, he was given two weeks of air firing before being presented with his gunnery wings.

BANKS HELPFUL IN BOND DRIVES

Cooperation of Oregon banks was a major factor in the success of the 6th war loan. E. C. Sammons, state chairman of the war finance committee, announces, and offers statistics compiled at the war finance committee office to substantiate his statement.

Oregon's 135 banks sold or processed \$122,034,100 worth of bonds or 77.6 per cent of the state's total for the 6th war loan. Malheur county banks issued \$499,300 in bonds during the campaign, or 63.3 per cent of the county total sales.

"Not only have the banks expended sizable sums for the expense of issuing bonds in the various war loan drives, but bank employees have been liberal purchasers under the payroll savings plan," said Sammons.

"Banks will join with other concerns in the payroll savings program on which the success of the 7th war loan will depend. With the largest E bond goal in the state's history, Oregon firms will make deductions for 13 weeks, April 9 to July 7, for the 7th war loan. What we will need is the same cooperation from other concerns that we have had from the banks."

ASSESSOR ATTACKS FILING DELINQUENCY

E. P. Hendrix, county assessor, mailed out several hundred letters last week in a final attempt to save the county taxpayers the expense of sending a deputy to assess personal property. There are less than 500 property owners who have failed to return their questionnaires, Mr. Hendrix said, but if they do not respond, the expense of a deputy for these few will be greater than the assessment expense of the questionnaire system for the entire county. Business men are the worst offenders, Mr. Hendrix said. Ninety-seven per cent of rural property owners have made their returns promptly.

The law provides a penalty of \$10 a day for each day of delinquency in filing returns after March 1. However, the burden of proof is on the county government, since a clause in the law makes it necessary to prove that the delinquency is intentional on the part of the property owner.

"We have adopted sound and modernized methods of appraisal procedure," Mr. Hendrix said, "and

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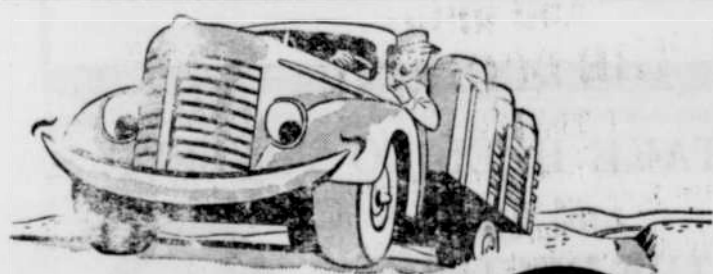
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
