VICTORY FOOD

"Eggs A La Mode"
If we translate the little phrase "a la mode" literally, we would find that it meant "in fashion." Right now eggs--almost any way you like them--are "a la mode." We know "a la mode" doesn't mean "with ice cream" as it has been commonly used.

There are lots of eggs on the market and they do their share in rounding out our diet. Don't worry the family about the nutrients they contain, just serve them generously.

"Baked Cheese Eggs"
6 eggs.
2 T. sharp cheese spread.
2 T. salad dressing.
2 T. finely chopped green pepper.
2 T. finely chopped celery.
1/4 t. salt.
Pinch of pepper.
1 cup of cornflakes.
1/4 t. melted butter.

Cook eggs in water just below boiling point about 20 minutes. Cover with cold water; remove shells. Cut eggs in halves lengthwise and remove yolks. Mash yolks and combine with cheese, salad dressing, green pepper, celery and seasonings. Refill egg whites rounding up filling. Place in well-greased shallow baking dish. Crush cornflakes into fine crumbs and mix with butter. Sprinkle buttered crumbs over the eggs; bake in a moderate oven about 15 minutes.
