T-5 Cpl. Viri Reitenbough, former Nyssa man, was here last week visiting his sister, Mrs. Lynn Snodgrass, and his father, George N. Reitenbough, whom he had not seen for the past three years.

Reitenbough was in the South Pacific with the 41st division early in 1942, and has arrived home on rotation. He went into the army before Pearl Harbor and trained at Port Lewis. His first overseas location was Australia, his division soon becoming famous as the "fighting-est" division of the entire war. Reitenbough, a truck driver, belonged to a tank destroyer outfit which moved into New Guinea with the rest of the division. He was there two years before getting a furlough and was never off the big island. He was at Oro bay for eight months, saw action in the Hollandia invasion and later was transferred to the 23rd division for the Wakde campaign, which was concerned chiefly with gleaning out Japanese who had been bypassed by MacArthur's skip-hop moves along the northern New Guinea coast. He left there about February 17, 1945, returning to the United States by boat. He will be sent to Santa Barbara, California for a 14-day rest before reassignment.

As for his long service, Reitenbough had little to say except "As far as I am concerned the Japs can have New Guinea back."
