Victory Food Hints By Leona Anderson Idaho Power Co. VICTORY FOOD "April Showers Bring Extra Cooking Time"

Spring is on the way and with it comes the showers to help bring May flowers. While it's raining outside, you can make a day of it in the kitchen. Bake a few things you have laid off on account of sugar rationing. By doing this, your family will rain a shower of approval on your efforts.

A favorite batch of drop cookies is like a peppy spring tonic. Here's the recipe--so try it. FUDGIES 1/4 cup shortening 1/2 cup sugar 1/2 cup corn sirup 1 teaspoon vanilla extract. 2 squares chocolate, melted. 2 cups sifted enriched flour. 1/2 teaspoon soda. 1/2 teaspoon salt. 1/2 cup buttermilk or sour milk. 1 egg. 3-4 cup chopped nuts.

Cream together shortening and sugar. Add corn sirup gradually, beating well after each addition. Blend in vanilla extract. Add egg. Beat well. Add melted chocolate. Sift together flour, soda and salt. Add to creamed mixture alternately with buttermilk or sour milk. Add nuts. Drop by teaspoonfuls on greased cookie sheets. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees, fahrenheit) 10 or 15 minutes. Yield: 4 dozen two-inch cookies.

Letters to the Editor A plea for a youth center Nyssa's future social and economic security will eventually rest upon the young people of today. These young people are not going to be capable of accepting such a responsibility tomorrow if their pent-up energy today wanders into the wrong channels.

It is a responsibility of the community to see that these "teen-agers" do not turn into delinquent cases, to see that the few delinquent cases now present are corrected. Some people may say, "That's the parents' responsibility." The parents may teach the child right from wrong, keep him busy at tasks at home, and send him to school. But what of leisure hours, when school is through and work is done? It is up to the community to supply something where the "teen agers" can spend their spare time healthfully and happily.

If no such facility is supplied the "kids" turn to other more harmful forms of amusement. I'm proposing a youth center with perhaps space for dancing, a nickelodeon, a "coke" stand, a few pool tables and a ping-pong table.

Last fall when a group of kids started discussing such a project their ideas were squelched with "There's a war on, where are you going to get materials?" "Where would you get manpower?" "It's too expensive--we haven't the money."

These arguments are rather weak in view of the facts--in words of one syllable "nuts". Somewhere someone secured money for the hospital, somewhere someone acquired several thousand dollars for the airport and somewhere someone found materials manpower and money to build a night club. Yet the people of Nyssa seem to think the kids are stepping out of line because they want somewhere to have fun.

Some people say that the kids wouldn't attend if they did have such an amusement hall. Kids aren't bad because they want to be bad--kids won't go out of their way to become delinquents, kids won't sneak off to some "speak-easy" or night club if they have a decent place to go.

We went to every possible source last fall trying to secure a building in which to start a "center". Few buildings were available and the owners of those were not willing to rent or loan to the "kids".

After a lot of talking and pleading, the Eagles finally consented to let us use their hall every other Saturday night. Since then the "kids" have been patronizing the "Teen Canteen". It is quite popular, but it still doesn't solve the problem of spare time. There are a lot of afternoons and evenings between every other Saturday night.

Anyone and everyone can find time to complain about the present state of "teen agers", but few find time to do anything about it. If you, the people of Nyssa, want this community to be socially and economically secure tomorrow, you've got to do something about it today. Nyssa needs a youth center.
